



## Developing Leadership Skills in an ACDA Student Chapter

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Establishing a dynamic student chapter of ACDA at your college or university is challenging, yet incredibly rewarding. Through a variety of projects, choral music students discover how to set goals, plan in detail, facilitate events, follow others, and lead in authentic ways.

If a student chapter is to experience success, finding and fostering students' leadership skills is essential. Although leadership may be difficult to define, there are a number of objective characteristics that surface by consensus. When working with student musicians consider the importance of fostering the following list of leadership characteristics.

## A leader will be able to . . .

- create or catch the vision. The eyes of a leader light up when discussing potential goals, projects, or events.
- feel the thrill of a challenge.
- express constructive discontent effectively instead of destructive malcontent.
- discern practical goals and ideas from impractical goals and ideas.
- take calculated risks. Be creative enough to turn lemons into lemonade.
- · accept responsibility.
- keep commitments and provide follow through.
- feel empowered through the empowerment of others.
- set a good example.
- accept criticism graciously.
- listen to others exceptionally well.
- inspire the respect of peers.
- be enthusiastic.
- maintain a state of good humor
- involve everyone. Be more concerned for the "we" than the "I".
- encourage others through positive communications.
- believe in others.
- celebrate the success of others.

I find it interesting that the leadership characteristics needed to guide a student organization successfully are the same qualities needed to run a successful choral program or music classroom. There is little doubt that teachers, especially music performance teachers, function in the role of a leader.

Although people may indeed be predisposed towards certain types of behaviors (the nature vs. nurture debate),
