Creating a PowerPoint Presentation Using Camtasia

Last week we shared some details on how you can do narrated PowerPoint presentation videos for your online courses. In today's weekly newsletter we want to share how you can create a PowerPoint screencast using Camtasia. The office of Distance Learning and Instructional Technologies recently bought a license of the Camtasia software that is available for faculty use in our workroom. Camtasia can be used to creates videos of screen captures, including mouse movements and can also be used to record "Voice-over slides" video type



presentation. Camtasia can also be used straight from a PPT ribbon add-in and the narration can be recorded at the same time as recording the PPT animation.

One of the greatest features of Camtasia is you can edit the video and cut out the unwanted pieces. You can also add zoom in and zoom out and many other cool transitions and callouts. Plus, the Notes section of the PPT can be imported as captions to support WGEA accessibility.
