
Distance Learning at UNT Dallas

More Spring 2016 Statistics

With over 160 eLearning and Hybrid courses, UNT Dallas eCampus offers the same excellent professors and small class size that students find in our face-to-face courses. Not every class at UNTD is available online, but our Distance Learning program offers a surprising number of them, and we're working on including all classes that fulfill core requirements and offering fully online programs in the near future.


Just two years ago, students filled **512 seats** in UNTD online courses. Since then, the number of filled seats has increased over **739%** to a total **4,298** this semester. This represents a **42% increase** if compared to the seats filled with DL courses offered during spring of last year.

In addition, if compared to the overall seat enrollment for this semester, seats filled through Distance Learning course offerings represents a 54% of the university total seat enrollment.

Highlights of Enrollment Analyses:

335 UNTD Students Learn Exclusively at a Distance

Overall distance education enrollments are continuing to grow from year to year and we have to look more closely at the details to get a more complete picture.

As of 2/9/2016, the number of **Online only students** for Spring 2016 is **335**. This means that one in seven (**14%**) of all our students are taking all of their courses **"Exclusively" at a distance**.




As of 02/10/16, UNTD total enrollment is 2,432 (including 257 College of Law students).

So this means that 14% of our students are exclusive ONLINE only students, students that do not get to come to campus on a regular basis as they take classes through the online environment.

54% of our Total Student Body Population is Taking a Part in Distance Learning Practices

As of 2/9/2016, the number of students who are taking at least one online course is 1,314. This means that in a group of 19 UNTD students, 10 are taking at least one distance learning course (54%).



Or in simpler figures, one of every two of our students are taking at least one course at a distance (hybrid or online).



5. Live Streaming

Making Your Courses Accessible for Those With Disabilities

If your courses have audio, what would a deaf or hard of hearing person need to do to access your content. If someone doesn't have the mobility to use a mouse and could only navigate using a keyboard, could he or she take your course? If a visually impaired person was using a screen reader, would he or she understand what's happening on screen?

Making your courses accessible means designing and building them in a way that anyone can access them. Some organizations do this because they consider it the right thing to do. Others do it because they specifically know they have learners who have accessibility needs. Others do it because they have to comply with laws or guidelines such as Section 508 and WCAG.

In this webinar, you'll learn what accessibility is and how it affects the design and development of your e-learning courses. Specifically, you'll learn:

- What is Section 508? WCAG? And who needs to comply with them?
- How do accessibility strategies impact the design of a course?
- What programming considerations are important?
- What additional steps are required to create an accessible course?
- How do different e-learning authoring tools compare in terms of accessibility?
- What tools are needed to test a course's accessibility?
