What Works - Tips from Instructors

We have collected the following tips from discussions and interactions with some of our faculty who teach online:

- role-playing exercises engage students
- peer review of work provides authentic audience and valuable feedback
- assigned discussion questions focuses the discussion and requires student participation
- frequent quizzes and short answer essays keeps students engaged and reduces procrastination
- success is in the details (provide lots of directions and be very explicit)
- student partners (allow students to guide direction of some course elements)
- control pace (close units after allotted time, make quizzes available/unavailable, require completion of one unit before going on to the next, etc.)



UNT Dallas Online Tip of the Week: Strategic Grading with Blackboard Rubrics

Question: You've got a graded discussion forum where students submit their initial post on Wednesday and their follow-up responses on Saturday. You'll be assessing both activities with a single rubric and want to get a head start on grading the initial posts. Can you grade only part of the rubric, save the score, and resume grading later with the scores intact?



Answer: Yes. With Blackboard rubrics, you can grade only part of the rubric, save and submit the data, and resume grading later on. Your initial scores will be preserved. Here's how:


1. Grade as much as the rubric as you'd like. When you're finished, click the Save Rubric button. Above this button, you'll see the raw total score displayed.



2. After you save the rubric, you then need to click the blue Submit button to preserve your scores in the gradebook. After submitting, a confirmation will display that your grade was saved successfully. The raw score will now replace the "0" in the grade box.



3. NOTE: This grade will replace the "needs grading" icon in the Blackboard Gradebook and will be visible to students. If you don't want students to see their score until grades are final, be sure to hide the assignment column from student view. The "Hide column from students" option is an on/off toggle available on the column's contextual menu (grey circle with chevron).



This flexible grading method can be applied to any multi-phase assignment where some components are ready before others but are bundled into a single rubric. The Save feature of Blackboard rubrics allows instructors to maximize grading time without the hassle of a separate system for tracking those partial scores.
