COURSE EVALUATION METHODS

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course

SPAN 3570

Participation and personal responsibility: personal responsibility is extremely important in this course. The success of the ESL adult program depends on you! Self-reflection: at the end of the semester you will write a self-reflection on your teaching. (30%)

Homework: the first weeks of the class you will have homework. The homework will train you in language methods and Spanish language vocabulary in the classroom setting. (20%)

Research paper: in your research paper you will discuss and present examples of common ESL errors from student writing and/or speaking. In your paper you will have to present whether the error is related to the Spanish language and what type of methodology you used in your classroom to correct the error. (40%)

Monographs on error analysis: You will write 2 monographs on linguistic issues that are difficult for English language learners. In these monographs you will have to present (a) what is the error (b) the linguistic source of these errors including

a linguistic analysis and (b) methods that you can use in the classroom to avoid these errors. (10%)
