In the last three years, states across the country have passed 205 laws that make it harder for women to get abortion care.

The 205 laws tend to fall into these categories:

- Making women undergo an ultrasound, whether or not the doctor says it is necessary. In some states, the doctor must describe the image and display it in front of the woman
- Making doctors give women medically inaccurate information
- Banning abortion at various stages, as early as six weeks
- Clinics that provide abortions must meet new building standards for new hospitals or else shut down (these laws only apply to abortion providers; other out-patient surgical centers are exempt)
- Forcing women to make multiple, medically-unnecessary appointments for care
- Making women go get counseling from health centers that advise childbirth over abortion
- Making it illegal for insurance plans to cover abortion care
- Making it illegal for Medicaid to cover abortion care, even when the woman's health is at risk
