THE INSPECTOR GENERAL ACT OF 1978

The IG Act of 1978, as amended, establishes the responsibilities and duties of an IG. It has been amended to increase the number of agencies with statutory IGs. There are now 72 statutory IGs. Cabinet-level IGs are appointed by the President and then confirmed by the U.S. Senate.

The Inspector General Act of 1978, as amended, states that IGs are to:

- Conduct and supervise audits and investigations to improve the operations and effectiveness of the Department (Sec. 2).
- Keep the Secretary of Defense and the Congress fully and currently informed about problems and deficiencies (Sec. 4(a)(5)).
- Be the principal adviser to the Secretary of Defense for matters relating to the prevention and detection of fraud, waste, and abuse (Sec. 8(c)(1)).

- The DoD OIG was established and implemented by DoD Directive 5106.1 on March 14, 1983.
- The Honorable Joseph Sherick was confirmed on May 20, 1983 as the first DoD IG. Since then, there have been seven Senate-confirmed IGs for the Defense Department.
- The Honorable Jon T. Rymer is the current DoD IG and was confirmed by the U.S. Senate on September 17, 2013.
