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COMMANDER'S VISION

U.S. Army Europe is America's land power that is an ocean closer to every major security challenge America faces. The European security environment is changing. Russian aggression in Ukraine, Syria, the Black Sea, and the Baltic Sea are creating multiple dilemmas for governments across Europe.

Fears of Russian encroachment coupled with an ever-present terrorist threat by radicalized Islamists, and the systemic stress of hundreds of thousands of refugees flowing into Europe is causing unprecedented change in a complex environment. U.S. Army Europe works in close cooperation with our European partners and allies on a daily basis. Through forward positioning, U.S. Army Europe's forces train to improve interoperability, become familiar with the environment, and build relationships that are crucial to a combat ready force.

The next year promises to see more emphasis in Atlantic Resolve South as we continue to work with partners and allies to build capability, increase capacity, and strengthen relationships necessary to adopt a deterrence posture in response to any challenge.

As a welcomed addition to the Strong Europe team, U.S. Army Europe is set to receive a full armored brigade combat team on a persistent rotational basis in Europe. Starting in 2017, U.S. Army Forces Command units will deploy for nine-month rotations as part of Atlantic Resolve, providing forces the opportunity to train and



maneuver as brigade combat teams in order to improve interoperability and achieve deterrence.

Beginning in spring 2017, U.S. Army Europe will receive an attack reconnaissance battalion and additional medical evacuation rotary wing platforms in Europe. Together with an aviation support battalion, a brigade headquarters and headquarters support company, the rotational aviation assets fill out a combat aviation brigade in theater. These critical assets will solidify a deterrence posture with a forward presence at improved airfields throughout the Atlantic Resolve countries - Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania and Poland.

To augment these regionally allocated forces, U.S. Army Europe will receive prepositioned vehicles, weapons, and equipment in theater beginning this year. To ensure the infrastructure is in place to support this increase in forces in Europe, the European Reassurance Initiative continues to provide critical resources that positively affect the operational environment. ERI is instrumental to ensuring U.S. forces are postured to deter aggression across Europe. U.S. Army Europe remains focused on taking an active role in deterring aggression with our partners and allies throughout Europe.

By being an ocean closer to America's strategic challenges, U.S. Army Europe stands ready to mitigate multiple threat scenarios in a rapid manner. U.S. Army Europe is at the leading edge of America's efforts to deter Russia, assure our allies, and protect U.S. interests.

U.S. Army Europe is a leadership laboratory that empowers junior leaders to thrive in a complex operating environment. These leaders are expected to operate in an environment of distributed operations -- often serving as the senior U.S. representative in a country. Under these conditions, they encounter unique challenges that could never be replicated outside of Europe. Junior leaders are executing the full range of operations from tactical to strategic as they integrate with our allies and partners, developing as leaders as described in the Army Operating Concept.

DYNAMIC PRESENCE



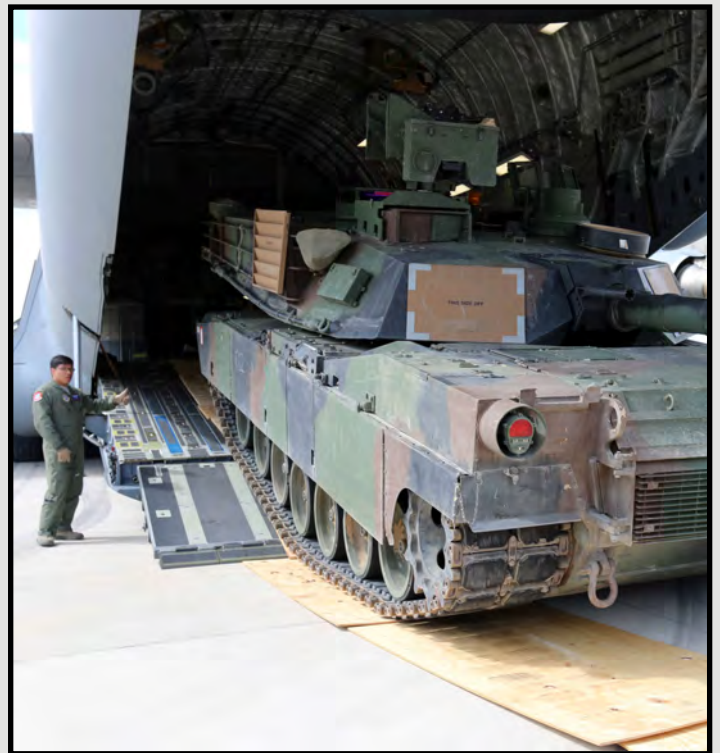

U.S. Army Europe is a smaller force than in previous years, but we leverage every opportunity to develop relationships and capabilities throughout Europe. Through dynamic presence we demonstrate and tell the Strong Europe story. Sometimes dynamic presence is a full battalion commitment to an exercise, other times it is a Soldier liaison officer or a meeting between key leaders from allied and partnered nations. It is constant contact with others, in Europe and the U.S.

WORKING WITH OUR ALLIES & PARTNERS



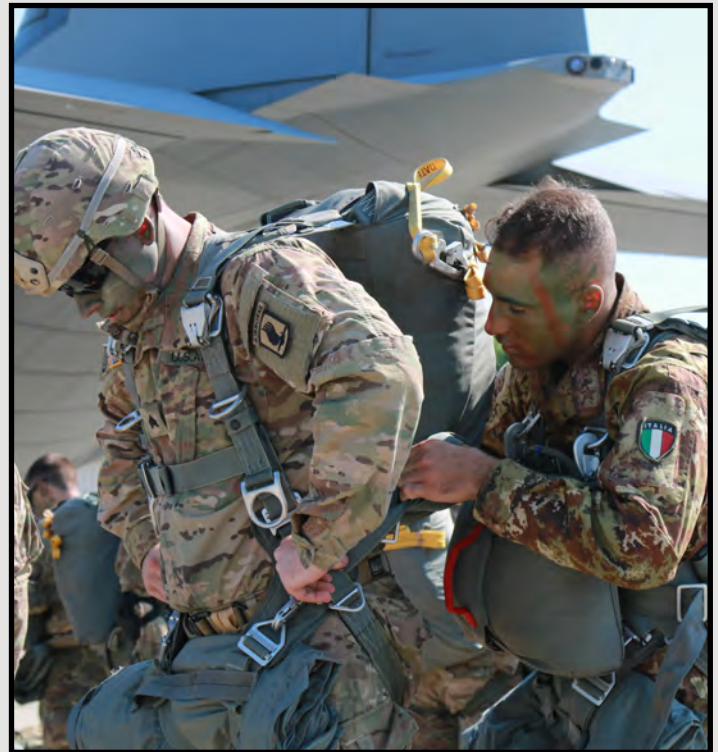
Working with our allies and partners is the normal way to operate in Europe. We contribute to strengthening our alliance as part of the NATO collective defense. The 7th Army Training Command is a place where U.S. forces train and practice interoperability with our allies and partners. Atlantic Resolve has resulted in 50 battalion-sized or greater exercises carried out from the Baltics to Black Sea so far this year. In Europe, it is not unusual to find U.S. military vehicles crossing a German-assembled bridge on British trucks. Together we forge a powerful land power network that simultaneously deters aggression and assures security.

U.S. Army Europe continues to lead the Army in integration of Regionally Allocated Forces, or RAF, by leveraging the European Rotational Force and multiple rotational aligned units. The 4th Infantry Division's out of Fort Carson, Colo., alignment with Europe further enables U.S. Army Europe to conduct joint and combined training in support of Atlantic Resolve using assigned forces. These forces train closely with our allies to improve interoperability, demonstrate the Army's power projection capability and provide assurance and deterrence.

INTEGRATING ARMY RESERVE & NATIONAL GUARD



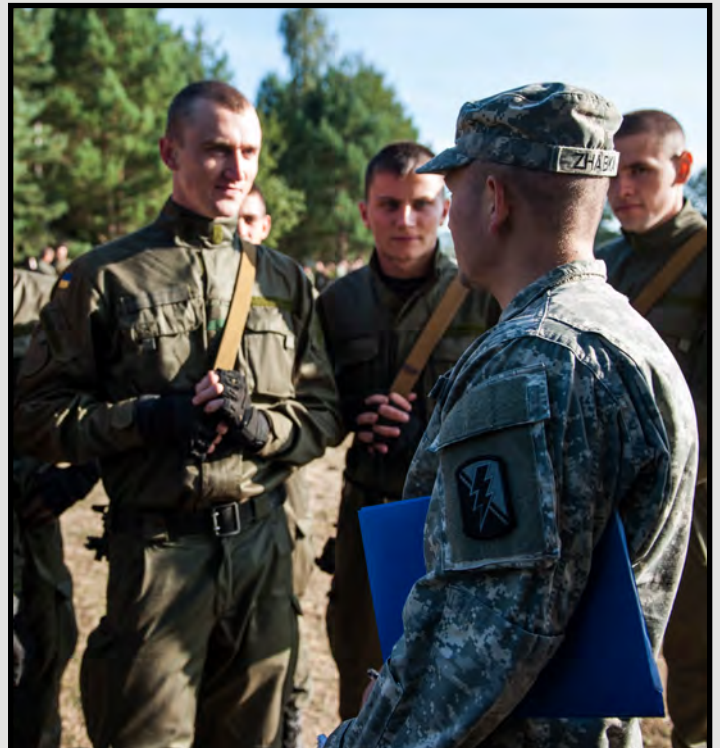
Integration of the National Guard and Army Reserve into the U.S. Army Europe team is a major component to making 30,000 Soldiers look and feel like 300,000. Army Reserve and Guard Soldiers play a vital role in boosting land force capability across U.S. Army Europe's footprint through the 21 U.S. states that participate in the State Partnership Program in 22 different countries and by leveraging Overseas Deployment Training rotations. The National Guard is resourced with units that supplement the active force and the Army Reserve provides both individuals and units. When we synchronize and integrate these assets, we achieve greater component interoperability and capability in Europe.

SABER JUNCTION

Saber Junction is U.S. Army Europe's annual combat training center certification exercise held at Grafenwoehr and Hohenfels Training Areas in Germany. It is designed to evaluate the readiness of one of its two combat brigades to conduct unified land operations (a simultaneous combination of offensive, defensive and stability missions), with an emphasis on tactical interoperability among allied and partner-nation forces.
