OHA Utility Survey needs your input

Housing officials encourage eligible military members to for the last 12 months. take the 2016 Overseas Housing Allowance Utility Survey,

which will be conducted in Belgium through Oct. 31.

Service members who have been stationed in Belgium for at least six months, currently reside in off-base housing, are in private leases under the OHA program and receive an Overseas Housing Allowance, are invited to take the survey. Maximum participation is essential because the Utility Allowance will be updated based on the results and will determine what Service members are paid at your location.

To prepare for the OHA Utility Expenses Survey, housing officials recommend that members collect their actual bills and records of utility and recurring maintenance expenses

Participation in this survey is voluntary. Failure to respond

will not result in penalty to the respondent. However, maximum response is encouraged so that data will be representative of your country of assignment.

This data is instrumental in updating utility allowances for the Overseas Housing Program. Incomplete surveys cannot be used as this might result in underreporting of utility/recurring maintenance expenses. Your response will be treated as confidential. Only group statistics will be reported.

<u>GAZETTE</u> SVCs advocates for sexual assault victims

The U.S. military continues to expand on the progress being made for thousands of sexual assault victims by giving them a voice in the criminal investigation and prosecutorial systems.

Among the Army's efforts to combat sexual assault in the ranks, the Special Victim Counsel Program was developed to strengthen the support of sexual assault victims and enhance their rights within the military justice system.

Special victims counselors are specially trained military attorneys, duty-bound to work for no one but the victim through the military justice process. Working with a robust support system of victim advocates and victim witness liaisons, they assist in ensuring that victims fully understand their rights throughout the military investigative, judicial and legal administrative process.

"It can be difficult to prosecute sex crimes in the military because of the fear of retribution and the stress of the judicial process; it can be too

long and traumatic," said Capt. Renee Darville, Northern Law Center client services chief. "So the Army said, 'Let's give the victim an attorney. Give them a voice and agency to determine what level they want to participate in, and help them feel more in control in the process.'"

According to the Department of Defense, victims must be confident that, should they report, they will be treated fairly. Part of that fair treatment is to ensure they know and can exercise their rights.

"I am an attorney specifically for the victim," Darville said. "I have 100-percent confidentiality. I am the victims' buffer and voice. I am here to help them heal but also by building victims' trust in the system, we hope they'll be more willing to report offenders."

The DOD received a total of 6,083 reports of sexual assault for allegations involving service members, according to the FY 15 Department of Defense annual report on sexual assault in the military.

Despite the substantial increase in reporting over the past 10 years, a significant number of sexual assaults go unreported each year. Only 23 percent of the estimated 20,300 service member victims who indicated experiencing a sexual assault reported the crime.

Focus group participants discussed likely reasons for not reporting an incident of sexual assault including fear of negative reactions from peers, impact on reputation, and concern of possible repercussions for collateral misconduct.

To combat this, the military added a requirement for victims to be provided with an explanation of the right to consult with an SVC and the availability of other legal assistance. Victims must receive this explanation at the time they initially report a sexual assault.



In addition, no one in a victim's chain of command or the accused's chain of command will influence an SVC in providing legal support to a victim.

"Our efforts are having an impact, but there are still many hurdles to overcome," said Army Maj. Gen. Camille Nichols, director of the Department of Defense Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Office. "Reporting the crime is essential for our ability to bring care and advocacy to survivors, and hold offenders appropriately accountable."

The 2015 Military Investigation and Justice Experience Survey, which obtained survivor feedback about participating in the military justice process, showed that most respondents were highly satisfied with the support they received. Seventy-seven percent said they would recommend other survivors come forward to report sexual assault.

It is imperative Army leaders and Soldiers, especially sexual assault victims, have confidence in the military justice system, the annual report said. Instilling trust and inspiring victims to report sexual offenses will assist the military in achieving the cultural change it desires.

Until then?

"[JAG] is a safe space," Darville said. "People come to legal assistance every day for all kinds of reasons so a victim does not have to worry about disclosing why they are here. People can access me without that fear."

She added, "It is never too early or too late to reach out; I can support at any point in the process."

All Saints day honors deceased

A public holiday in Belgium, All Saints Day, Nov. 1, honors all Christian saints. Belgians often celebrate Toussaint, its French name, by placing chrysanthemums on the graves of dead relatives as All Souls Day, Nov. 2, is not a public holiday.

At this period of time, chrysanthemums are available in all flower shops, in all varieties and colors. It is one of the few flowering plants that florish at this time and doesn't need a lot of care.

In many countries, such as Italy, France and Portugal, people place a lighted candle on the graves of deceased relatives. Filipinos traditionally observe this day by visiting the family dead and cleaning and repairing their tombstones. The first day of the Day of the Dead celebration in Mexico, All Saints Day honors deceased children and infants. Although not a public holiday in the Netherlands, All Saints Day is observed on the first Sunday in November there.

The first All Saints Day occurred May 13, 609, when Pope Boniface IV accepted the Pantheon in Rome as a gift from Byzantine Emperor Phocas. The pope dedicated the day as a holiday to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the martyrs. Things turned bad for Phocas the following year, and in 610 he was beheaded by Heraclius who usurped the throne.

In 835, Pope Gregory III moved the holiday to Nov. 1 and expanded it to include the honoring of all saints. In Roman Catholicism, All Saints Day is a holy day of obligation on which Catholics are encouraged to attend Mass.

Chrysanthemums in various colors are placed on the graves in the Chièvres cemetery. It is traditional for Belgians to bring flowers and visit the graves of deceased relatives prior to or on All Saints' Day, Nov. I. This day is a Belgian national holiday and most stores will be closed while some supermarkets will remain open in the morning. (U.S.Army photo by Cis Spook)
