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AMIS Announces Successful Migration of TC-AIMS II 7.0.1.1


On Friday, 04 December 2015, after a long two-year journey of developing and testing the latest release of the Transportation Coordinators'-Automated Information for Movements System II (TC-AIMS II), the **Automated Movement** and Identification Solutions (AMIS) team successfully completed a two-week **Government Acceptance** Test (GAT) of TC-AIMS II version 7.0.1.1 software



release. This release contains the highly-anticipated Transportation Tracking Numbers (TTN) function as well as being Web-based.

On Monday 07 December 2015, the developers and AMIS personnel spent the week verifying data and preparing for the migration. The database team transformed production data from Barstow v6.3.1 and Southwest Asia v5.5 into production TC-AIMS II v7.0.1.1. The data was imported into the migrated application several days ahead of schedule. TC-AIMS II v7.0.1.1 was officially launched into production on Friday 11 December 2015.

To celebrate this momentous event a small reception was held, with cake for the Exeter and Apptricity developers, who spent many long hours developing and testing this product. AMIS personnel were present to celebrate, along with representatives from the Deployment Process Modernization Office (DPMO), Forces Command (FORSCOM) and the U.S. Navy. The mood was very positive, and the excitement in the room was electrifying. Our users have already begun to register their Common Access Card (CAC) to the migrated application and have started working with the new product.

the first program in PEO EIS to do so. We continued efforts to marshal the resources and support to stay on course
with Condition Based Maintenance plus Store and Forward (CBM+ SaF). And finally, our AMIS workforce once again
showed their kindness and benevolence by donating 13 bikes to the USMC Reserve Toys for Tots holiday drive. The
