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VAW-77 assists Colombian military in seizures of cocaine worth \$610 Million

BARRANQUILLA – The U.S. Navy assisted the Colombian military in intercepting several narcotics smuggling vessels laden with cocaine headed to the U.S. where the street value of the white powder would have been a staggering \$610 million.



During a routine Combating Transnational Organized Crime (C-TOC) Operations patrol Nov. 7, the crew of an E-2C Hawkeye long-range surveillance plane assigned to VAW-77

spotted a Go-Fast boat 120 nautical miles southeast of the San Andres Islands in the Western Caribbean. With overlapping radar coverage provided by an additional Hawkeye, the E-2 aircrew ensured constant monitoring and successfully vectored USS *Oak Hill* (LSD 51) in intercepting the Go-Fast. As two over-the-horizon interceptor boats from *Oak Hill* came along side the Go-Fast, the crew scuttled the boat. However, *Oak Hill* recovered 2 metric tons (valued at \$350 million) of cocaine and placed four narco-terrorists into custody.



Less than one week earlier on Nov. 3, the crew of an E-2C Hawkeye, also assigned to VAW-77, spotted a semipropelled, semi-submersible boat and a Go-Fast, coordinated the launch of Colombian aircraft and coast guard boats, which then intercepted the vessels.

With intelligence gathered from the seized semisubmersible and the Go-Fast, the Colombian Coast Guard located a narcotics vessel construction site in the jungles surrounding the Colombian coastline. Special Operations Forces found and secured 1.5 Metric Tons of cocaine (street value over \$260 million) and another Go-Fast being prepped for narcotics transport.

The use of semi-submersibles is one example of how drug traffickers are changing their tactics in an effort to avoid being detected. They are usually powered by a single diesel engine and can hold an average payload of five metric tons.

The Nightwolves of Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron 77 (VAW-77) based at Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base New Orleans, comprise the U.S. Navy's only fully dedicated counter-narcotics squadron. VAW-77's beginnings go back to 1995, when the U.S. Congress created the reserve squadron as a result of the United States escalating war on illegal drug trafficking. VAW-77 received four specially modified E-2C Hawkeye airborne early warning aircraft optimized for counter-drug missions. As part of the Navy's post-Cold War role, VAW-77 flight crews patrol the waters of the Caribbean in joint missions with other drug enforcement agencies in search of illegal aircraft and ships.

The officers and enlisted members of VAW-77 are a mix of Selected Reservists and active Full Time Support (FTS) personnel. Because the squadron is a component of the Navy Reserve, a significant number of its men and women are Selected Reservists. They participate in the squadron's mission on a part-time basis because of their civilian commitments. Currently, VAW-77 has a detachment forward-deployed to Barranquilla, Columbia as part of an ongoing partnership with the Colombian military.

Key Messages

VAW-77 assisted the Colombian government in the seizure of 3.5 metric tons of cocaine that would have eventually made its way to markets in North America and denied narco-terrorists \$610 million in potential profit.

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
