CISA's MASSS Program

The College of International Security Affairs (CISA) is one of the National Defense University's five colleges and the Department of Defense flagship school for education and the building of partnership capacity in combating terrorism and irregular warfare at the strategic level. CISA prepares students for high-level policy and command and staff responsibilities through a graduate education program. CISA has two locations: the main campus at the National Defense University located at Ft. Lesley J. McNair in Washington, DC; and an additional location at the US Army JFK Special Warfare Center and School's Colonel Aaron Bank Hall.

CISAs Master of Arts in Strategic Security Studies is a 10-month, 36-credit hour graduate program. Our outstanding faculty approach the field of security studies by balancing theory with practical application. CISA's curriculum focuses on the contemporary international security environment emphasizing the proliferation of security actors, complex threats and dimensions, the unprecedented scope and speed of information, a full spectrum of conflict and war, and new dynamic elements of security, as well as classical concepts.

The Masters Program is delivered at the United States Army John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center and School to Joint Special Operations Forces personnel. Students attend classes full-time for 10 months, taking six to seven graduate classes each semester. Each course draws upon the diverse experience base of its participants in an interactive seminar setting. The courses emphasize leadership, logical analysis, and making effective arguments, presentations, and decisions. Through active seminar participation, independent study, and the research and writing of a thesis, the Joint Special Operations Master of Arts (JSOMA) Program assists students in developing an enhanced capacity to think critically at the strategic level of analysis.

Curriculum

The curriculum* offered in the JSOMA program at USAJFKSWCS Program gives students a deeper understanding of the following strategic issues:

- theory to practice
- instruments of national power
- key international actors
- global security environment
- historical context
- theoretical and academic foundations

The curriculum is comprised of:

- **Geostrategy:** Contemporary security environment analysis
- **Power, Ideology, and Legitimacy:** A political theory primer
- **Origins of Conflict and War:** Historical theoretical international security
- **American Foreign Relations:** From colony to superpower
- **Warriors of the Mind: Strategic Influence in the 21st Century**
- **The Information and Cyber Revolutions**
- **International Political Economics:** Communication & Influence in Complex Systems
- **Conflict Resolution Strategies:** Conflict causes & solutions
- **Comparative Political Analysis:** Government principles & practices
- **Strategic Leadership and Ethics:** Building strategic advisors
- **Strategic Influence:** Communication & influence in complex systems
- **NATO and European Security**

Research and Thesis Requirements

- **Methods of Analysis and Argumentation:** Foundations of analytical training
- **Thesis (50-75 pages)**
