<u>The History of Independence Day:</u> On July 4, 1776, the thirteen colonies claimed their independence from England, an event which eventually led to the formation of the United States. Each year on July 4th, also known as Independence Day, Americans celebrate this historic event.


Conflict between the colonies and England was already a year old when the colonies convened a Continental Congress in Philadelphia in the summer of 1776. In a June 7 session in the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall), Richard Henry Lee of Virginia presented a resolution with the famous words: "Resolved: That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."

Lee's words were the impetus for the drafting of a formal Declaration of Independence, although the resolution was not followed up on immediately. On June 11, consideration of the resolution was postponed by a vote of seven colonies to five, with New York abstaining. However, a Committee of Five was appointed to draft a statement presenting to the world the colonies' case for independence. Members of the Committee included John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania, Robert R. Livingston of New York and Thomas Jefferson of Virginia. The task of drafting the actual document fell on Jefferson.

On July 1, 1776, the Continental Congress reconvened, and on the following day, the Lee Resolution for independence was adopted by 12 of the 13 colonies, New York not voting. Discussions of Jefferson's <u>Declaration of Independence</u> resulted in some minor changes, but the spirit of the document was unchanged. The process of revision continued through all of July 3 and into the late afternoon of July 4, when the Declaration was officially adopted. Of the 13 colonies, nine voted in favor of the Declaration, two -- Pennsylvania and South Carolina -- voted No, Delaware was undecided and New York abstained. John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress, signed the Declaration of Independence. It is said that John Hancock's signed his name "with a great flourish" so England's "King George can read that without spectacles!"

Today, the original copy of the Declaration is housed in the National Archives in Washington, D.C., and July 4 has been designated a national holiday to commemorate the day the United States laid down its claim to be a free and independent nation.

Preventing identity theft – getting a free credit report: By **Mary M. Benzinger**, *Esquire, Senior Attorney, Pentagon Army and Air Force Legal Assistance Office*. We hear a lot in the news today about "identity theft." In this next series of articles, I'll give you some pointers on how to minimize the risk that you'll become a victim. For example, a man begins getting letters and phone calls from a credit card company telling him he is in default on his account. He doesn't have an account with that company . . . or so he thinks. In fact, his daughter had opened an account in his name without his permission. As long as the daughter was paying on the account, he remained unaware. When she stopped making payments, that's when the company began to contact him. This "surprise" could have been avoided if he was a little more vigilant about his accounts. So how do you find out if there are accounts in your name you don't know about? It's pretty easy. Under federal law, you are entitled to obtain an annual free credit report, normally from the big three credit reporting companies: Experian, Transunion and Equifax. It's really free . . .nothing to sign up for, no credit card required, no

gimmicks. Simply go to **www.annualcreditreport.com** and follow the steps. You will have to provide a social security number and other personal information. Be prepared to print or save to your computer the credit reports as they are typically only available during that login session. You can only do this once per year. If you want to review your reports more often, you can request one report from a different company every four months. You can also request your free report by phone by calling (877) 322-8228. Read your reports carefully. Look for accounts that you do not recognize, addresses listed for you that you've never lived at, credit inquiries from companies you don't recognize and make sure any other information on the report is completely accurate.

Eligibility for the TRICARE Retiree Dental Program includes "gray area" retirees

The Enhanced TRICARE Retiree Dental Program is available to all military retirees (including "gray area" retirees under age 60) and their eligible family members, unremarried surviving spouses and their eligible children, as well as MOH recipients and their eligible immediate family members. The program covers cleanings, exams, fillings, root canals, gum surgery, oral surgery and dental accidents on the first day that coverage becomes effective; after 12 months of being in the program, it then covers crowns, bridges, partials, braces and dental implants. (New retirees who enroll within four months after retirement from the Uniformed Services or transfer to Retired Reserve status are eligible to waive the 12-month waiting period for major services; supporting documentation is required)

The Enhanced TRDP provides every enrollee an annual maximum of \$1,300 per person, a \$1200 annual maximum for dental accidents and a \$1750 lifetime maximum for orthodontics. It is important to note that the money that the TRDP pays out for preventive and diagnostic services doesn't count against the annual maximum – those benefits are in addition to the \$1300. Retirees can find more information on the program, as well as enroll 24/7/365, online by visiting **trdp.org**. TRDP enrollees realize the maximum program savings (an average of 22%) when seeing a network provider. National Guard and Reserve members who enroll in the **TRICARE Retiree Dental Program** (**TRDP**) within four months after their transfer to retired reserve status—including "gray area" retirees under age 60—are eligible to skip the 12-month waiting period normally required for major TRDP benefits like crowns, bridges, implants and braces.

As with all new retirees, the four-month period during which a "gray area" retired Reserve or Guard member can enroll in the TRDP and qualify for the 12-month waiting period waiver begins with his/her retirement effective date. Eligibility to enroll in the TRDP and qualify for the waiver *is not* contingent on the date the member reaches age 60 and begins collecting retirement pay.

HANSCOM AIR FORCE BASE, Mass. -- Several base support agencies will soon consolidate under one roof following the recent completion of a \$5.3 million renovation project on Building 1240.

The facility -- named the Community Support Center -- combines in one building the Airman and Family Readiness Center, Equal Opportunity, Joint Personal Property Shipping Office for outbound personnel and Veterans Administration Benefits Office. It will also be home to the community support

coordinator, sexual assault response coordinator and the newly created primary prevention specialist position.

"It's exciting to see the Community Support Center project finally complete and serve as a hub for these support organizations," said Robyn Endo, chief of A&FRC, which will be the largest tenant in the building. "Customers to the Airman and Family Readiness Center will be able to participate in a wide array of classes and services in this beautiful new facility."She added that improved parking is another advantage customers can look forward to.

According to Mike Lynch, 66th Civil Engineering Division chief of Portfolio Optimization, the new 15,800 square foot facility has been in the works for nearly five years. "The project included \$5 million to remodel Building 1240 and more than \$300,000 to demo Buildings 1217 and 1218, which will now allow for future projects in their location," Lynch said.

A newcomer to Hanscom AFB is the United Service Organizations of New England, or USO, which will also have an office in the Community Support Center.

The USO office will provide service members with local maps, travel assistance and information on regional, cultural and recreational offerings, said Jean Mallon, USO New England director.

While many of the offices are moving, temporary closures have been necessary to facilitate the transition into the new building, which is located near the Minuteman Commons. Community Support Center officials encourage customers to contact the specific office they need before visiting to ensure they are open for business.

The Community Support Center is scheduled to be fully open by the end of the month. The location was once the Enlisted Club, as well as a temporary fitness center when remodeling took place of the current fitness center.

The Center will be open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Officials are in the planning phase of hosting an open house and ribbon cutting later this summer. For further information on each of the offices located in the Community Support Center, contact each respective organization.

This is a mandatory requirement for out-processing.

Avoid Mosquito

Not all mosquitoes are the same. Different mosquitoes spread different diseases and bite at different times of the day. The mosquitoes that can spread Zika, dengue and chikungunya viruses are aggressive daytime biters. They can also bite at night, indoors or around the outside of homes.

THE BEST WAY TO PREVENT ZIKA IS TO PREVENT MOSQUITO BITES!



Minimize time outside when mosquitoes are active.

- Eliminate standing water (where mosquitoes breed) around your home and business.
- Wear loose long-sleeved shirts and long pants. Mosquitoes can bite through thin or tight clothing.
- Stay in places with air conditioning or use screens that keep mosquitoes outside.
- Use DEET or picaridin insect repellent on exposed skin (face, hands, wrists).
- Treat clothing and gear with permethrin or buy permethrin-treated clothing.

Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) registered insect repellents

Use repellent when you are outdoors. Use products with active ingredients that are safe and effective.

- Always follow the product label instructions.
- When using sunscreen, put sunscreen on first and insect repellent second.
- It is safe for pregnant or nursing women to use EPAapproved repellents when applied according to label instructions.

If you have a baby or child Follow product label instructions.

- Do not use insect repellents on babies younger than 2 months.
- Dress babies or small children in clothing that covers arms and legs or cover crib, stroller and baby carrier with mosquito netting.
- Do not apply insect repellent to a child's hands, eyes, mouth or any cuts or irritated skin.
- Spray insect repellents onto your hands and then apply to a child's face.



For Extra Protection Wear Permethrin-treated

Permethrin is an insecticide that kills mosquitoes and other insects.

- Use permethrin to treat clothing and gear (boots, pants, socks, tents), or purchase permethrin-treated clothing and gear.
- If treating items yourself, always follow product label instructions.
- Treated clothing remains protective after multiple washings. See product information to find out how long the protection will last.
- Do not apply permethrin solutions directly to skin.
- The permethrin factory-treated Army Combat Uniform (ACU Permethrin) was introducted in October 2012 and protects Soldiers, as part of the DOD Insect Repellent System.
