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Noteworthy News

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From the Helm (continued)

In September, the Commander of JTF CapMed chartered the Council to develop and implement a plan that will carry out the provisions of an overall regional civilian human resources policy. The current focus of the Council is to:

1. Ensure the guaranteed placement of civilian medical employees who remain at Walter Reed Army Medical Center through closure or until their work is transferred.
2. Fully utilize available incentives and pay flexibilities to achieve Walter Reed sustainment and the availability of needed skills across the region.
3. Provide for a phased approach designed to maximize the movement of current employees to their preferred locations and the recruitment of new employees with designated 2011 duty stations in order to avoid involuntary displacements and to ensure that Walter Reed National Military Medical Center and the new Community Hospital at Fort Belvoir have trained and ready staffs when the new facilities are available.

The Council members are committed to using a collaborative approach to solving the myriad of civilian personnel issues that will be encountered during the transition. They are dedicated to ensuring that the interests and concerns of civilians at all regional MTFs are identified and considered as decisions are made over the next two and a half years. The overall goal of the Council is to ensure that ALL MHS civilian employees have the opportunity to do challenging and rewarding work in a world class health care system in 2011.

The Council will meet monthly to develop a global understanding of data and processes in all of the affected hospitals and to hear information from HR experts from all of the facilities about how existing service and command specific processes can be merged or modified or re-defined to support MHS civilian personnel administration in a new joint environment. To date, the council has facilitated two decisions: All medical civilian staff at the new Walter Reed Military Medical Center and the new Community Hospital at Fort Belvoir will be Department of Defense (DoD) civilian employees, not Army, Navy or Air Force civilian employees. Also, a Guaranteed Placement Program (GPP) will be implemented at Walter Reed Army Medical Center to encourage current civilian employees to remain through the facility's closure. Both measures are designed to ensure that the new facilities have trained and robust staffs to carry out the mission of caring for our nation's beneficiaries.

Since these steps are historical in nature and have never been attempted before, many decisions remain to be made. Future articles will detail what the Council members are learning from each other and provide more information on the CHR Advisory Group, a team of human resources experts from across DoD, who are supporting the efforts of the CHR Council.

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WRAMC Town Hall



Brigadier General Phil Volpe, Deputy Commander of JTF CAPMED, addressed a group of Walter Reed staff members at a December 16th BRAC Town Hall meeting. The presentation was one in a series of Town Hall meetings being hosted across the Region to update the various medical staffs on construction, integration, civilian personnel issues, and transformation.

"This is a huge undertaking," the General told the audience. "But it's also very exciting and we want to do this right."

Interspersed throughout his presentation were humorous slides that elicited a few chuckles from the crowd. But while many in the audience had seen and heard information about JTF CapMed, his discussion also included the sharing of some updated information. BG Volpe included in his presentation a discussion on the definition of what "World-Class" means. Some of his bullet points on this topic included:

- Comprehensive Healthcare Services & Systems
- Quality and Safe Practice of Medicine
- Top Notch People (Military and Civilian)
- Developing and Attracting Leaders in Medicine
- State of the Art Equipment and Furnishings
- Modern 21st Century Facilities
- Leading Edge Research and Publications
- World Renowned Academics, Professional Education and Training
- Patient Friendly; Focus on the Customer; Service-Oriented Climate
- Specialized Healing & Wellness Environment
- Partnerships with other World-renowned Healthcare, Scientific and Research Institutions
- Multiple Integrated Specialty Centers of Excellence

He summarized that "World-Class is about building, sustaining and nurturing a reputation. It means nothing if you refer to yourself as 'World-Class.' It's only when others refer to you as 'World-Class,' that you have really achieved something."

His enthusiasm for the tasks that lay ahead was evident throughout the Town Hall meeting and was highlighted when he discussed “What can we gain from these transformational initiatives?” His focus was clear about the advantages of what we are building:

- Joint Regional Approach to Healthcare Delivery.
- Clear Lines of Authority & Priority.
- Unity of Effort & Resource Sharing.
- Promote Interoperability.
- Create Common Standards and Processes.
- Support Both Joint and Service-unique Requirements.
- Balance the Operational/Readiness and Benefit Missions.
- Eliminate Layers of Command and Duplication Over Time.
- Synchronization within the NCR & JOA.
- DHS / NCR Routine & Disaster Support Coordination.
- Advocate for Resources and Solutions to Challenges.
- Influence the MHS for Enterprise-wide Transformation.

As the Town Hall drew to a close, the General opened up the floor for questions, and there were a few questions on a variety of topics:

Q: “What about Malcolm Grow? We didn’t hear any discussion about how they will be involved in this transformational process.”

A: Malcolm Grow will be transitioned to an out-patient only facility by 2011, as mandated by BRAC Law.

Q: “I heard that civilians transitioning to the Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda will become Department of the Navy Civilians. Is this true?”

A: No. All civilians working at the new Walter Reed and the new Community Hospital at Fort Belvoir will be Department of Defense (DoD) civilians.

Q: “Traffic around and base-access to the Bethesda facility is difficult to navigate. Is there a plan to address that? What about Fort Belvoir?”

A: National Naval Medical Center at Bethesda has not only published a Master Plan, but they have also developed a Transportation Plan to address these specific issues. As for Fort Belvoir, state and county officials are fully aware that Route 1, which is already congested and which runs right through the base, will need to be redone both on the base and off. As with Montgomery County’s efforts to secure funding for widening projects along Wisconsin Avenue in Bethesda, Virginia government officials are looking at a variety of options and pursuing funding for Route 1 improvements.

A continuing theme for the General throughout this Town Hall was this: BRAC is a *good* thing. “Many people don’t see it that way, but it is,” he said. “It’s the tool we’re using to implement integration and transform a stove-piped system. If it wasn’t for BRAC, integrating military healthcare wouldn’t get done. Thanks to BRAC, now we have a Law that says we have to do it. Thanks to BRAC, we have a Deadline. Once we’re done, we will gain an effectiveness and efficiency that will truly make us a World-Class Regional Military Healthcare System.”

In December, JTF CapMed hosted the first ever Emergency Managers Conference at USU and invited Emergency Managers and Public Health Emergency Managers from the Region.




