Dear Dr. Langer:

This responds to your electronic mail request requesting clarification on whether your LUKAS Berlin Water Mixable Artists' Oil Colours, art. no. 0808-0990, with a flashpoint of 313°C - 315°C is regulated under the Hazardous Materials Regulations (HMR; 49 CFR Parts 171-180). Specifically, you would like a letter confirming your conclusions that these materials are not hazardous and, therefore, should not be confiscated by Transportation Security Administration (TSA) officials when placed in your checked baggage.

Under § 173.22 of the HMR, it is the shipper's responsibility to properly classify a hazardous material. Generally, this office does not perform that function. However, based on the information you provided, we agree that these oil paints do not meet the flammable or combustible liquid criteria found in § 173.120 of the HMR. Further, after reviewing the material safety data sheet (MSDS) you provided for the paints, we do not believe that they meet any of the hazard classes defined in Part 173 of the HMR.

TSA is the agency responsible for security in all modes of transportation, including civil aviation, and has the authority to restrict passengers from carrying materials perceived as security threats. Therefore, TSA officials may confiscate materials that they believe to be security risks even if the materials are not classified as hazardous under the HMR. We recommend that when placing your oil paints in your checked baggage that you inform the carrier's agent when checking in for your flight and that you pack them with a copy of the MSDS and this letter.

I trust this satisfies your request. Please contact us if we can be of further assistance.

Dear DOT Representative,

I am an artist and would like to continue to travel to paint in various locations around the US and Europe. After speaking on the phone with your hazard materials representative on 6/4/07 and explaining that although I included the product safety information in my luggage with my artist colors, they were removed from by checked suitcase by the airlines without any indication that they had done so. Since the information provided indicated that they were not hazardous, your representative said that they should not have been removed and suggested, based on the information I included below, that I write to you and request a "Formal Interpretation" document from you to include with my colors next time I travel.

I look forward to receiving the document as soon as possible. Artists have always been able to travel the world in order to paint beautiful sites. However, without the ability to take their oil colors with them, this will no longer be possible. I can tell you that all the artists I know are now faced with the dilemma of having with their easels, brushes and canvases but NO artist oils when they get to their painting locations! (nowithstanding the loss of their huge financial investment in their oil colors) and would appreciate your checking into this matter and alleviating the problem.

The US Department of Transportation defines "flammable liquids" as those with a flash point of 140 F. This Lukas product has a flash point of 595.4 degrees Farenheit (or 313 degrees Centigrade). Hence, THEY ARE NOT HAZARDOUS. The information that I have included below is only the information that I felt was relevant to airline travel that was sent by the Lukas representative based on their Safety Data Sheet (2001/58/EG) dated 9/1/05.

A check of additional manufacturers of artist grade oil colors shows that they are based on vegetable oil with a flash point at or above 450 degrees (see manufacturers: eg., Gamblin and Winsor Newton).

Dear Dr. Langer,

Our safety data for LUKAS BERLIN Trade name Water Mixable Artists' oil colors (art.no0808-0990) indicate that they not dangerous according to the transport regulations (GGVS/GGVE/RID/ADR/IMDG Code/ICAO-TI.). Based on information available to us, this product is not a hazardous substance in the meaning of the law on chemicals or the regulations on hazardous substances in the version which is currently valid. The base is vegetable oil (sunflower and linseed). The flash point is 313-315 degrees Centigrade. But ask your airline before the flight. It seems, that some airlines have stricter rules than other.

Dear Dr. Kleine,

I would appreciate your sending me the product safety sheet with regard to your oil paints and also you Berlin water-mixable oils. I have recently returned from a flight from Italy to the US and the airlines confiscated my Winsor Newton water mixable paints as they believed they were a safety hazard. I included the flash points of the product but they disregarded it and took the paint anyway. I have ordered Lukas Berlin water mixable paints to replace the ones that were taken, however, I want to avoid the problem of having them confiscated again when traveling by air.

Is there an official document with which you could provide me? I

have spoken to the U.S. Hazardous Materials Information Center and they said that if I provide them with a letter and information from the manufacturer that the paints are not flamable or not flamable at a low flashpoint, they would provide me with an official letter to include with the paints. It is so frustrating to get to one's painting destination with all the equipment with which to paint and not have any paints.

I would greatly appreciate your assistance in this matter as soon as possible.
