RAILROAD CROSSING SAFETY FOR PEDESTRIANS

Always Expect a Train

As pedestrians we need to:

- Stay alert—it is easy to get distracted, especially by phones, music, and conversation
- Stop, look both ways, and listen
- Follow all signs and instructions
- Cross the tracks only at designated pedestrian or roadway crossings
- Cross quickly, never stop on tracks
- Be especially cautious if crossing a railroad on a bike, with a stroller, or in a wheelchair. Always cross at a 90° angle as your wheels can become stuck on the tracks





Before you cross, make sure you stop, look both ways for an approaching train, and listen. Do not let yourself be distracted by friends, phones, or music.

Stay at least 10 feet away from tracks when waiting for a train to pass. Trains are wider than the tracks and can overhang the tracks.

Never loiter or stop on tracks. Not all crossings will have this sign, regardless, never stop on the tracks.

Stop, look both ways, and listen. This crossbuck sign marks where the railroad tracks are located. Often a crossbuck will be accompanied by a sign that will tell you how many tracks are at the crossing. If there is more than one track, always look for a second train.

Cross tracks ONLY at designated pedestrian or roadway crossings. Always remember—the only safe place to cross is at a designated crossing. If you cross at any other place, you are trespassing and can be ticketed or fined.

If your vehicle stalls or is stuck on the crossing, move away from the tracks and your car at a 45° angle. Call the number on the Emergency Notification System (ENS) sign (or 911 if sign is not visible) for help.

Stop—never disregard a gate or ignore signs or flashing lights posted at a railroad crossing. Be aware-not all crossings have gates and/or flashing lights. This does NOT mean the railroad is not in use. Regardless of signage, always proceed through a crossing with caution.

Do not put yourself and others at risk by trying to take a photo on the tracks.
