I am pleased to submit the enclosed Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant Program Annual Report to Congress. Under 49 U.S.C. § 5116(k), the U.S. Secretary of Transportation is required to submit a report to Congress on the planning and training grants administered by the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration. The report covers HMEP grants awarded in fiscal years 2007, 2008, and 2009 and used during fiscal years 2008, 2009, and 2010, respectively.

The safe transportation of hazardous materials is one of my top priorities. The HMEP grants provide the assistance that States, Territories, and Native American Tribes need to enhance hazardous materials planning and training.

Similar letters have been sent to the Speaker and the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; Majority Leader of the Senate; Chairman and Ranking Member of the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation; and the Chairman and Ranking Member

of the House Committee on Transportation and infrastructure.

I. INTRODUCTION

The U.S. Department of Transportation's (DOT), Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration's (PHMSA), Hazardous Materials Grant Program (the program) is comprised of three emergency preparedness grants: Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grants, Supplemental Public Sector Training Grants (SPSTG), and Hazmat Materials Instructor Training (HMIT) Grants. The program is funded by registration fees collected from hazardous materials (hazmat) shippers and carriers who offer for transportation or transport certain hazmat in intrastate, interstate, or foreign commerce in accordance with 49 CFR Part 107, Subpart G. These fees fund training and planning grants, monitoring and technical assistance, curriculum development, and staffing costs. Registration fees also fund the publication and distribution of the Emergency Response Guidebook (ERG). Total program budgets, per fiscal year, are detailed in section II, Grant Budget and Administration.

The HMEP grant program, as mandated by 49 U.S.C. 5101 et seq., provides Federal financial and technical assistance to States, Territories, and Indian Tribes to "develop, improve, and carry out emergency plans" within the National Response System and the Emergency Planning and Community Right-To-Know Act of 1986 (EPCRA, Title III), 42 U.S.C. 11001 et seq. The program is designed to allow grantees flexibility in implementing training and planning programs that address differing needs for each location based on demographics, emergency response capabilities, commodity flow studies¹, and hazard analysis. States have the ability to target specific training needs and planning activities using these funds.

Governors in each State, or their counterparts within Territories or Native American Tribes, designate an agency to receive the HMEP grant funds. Agencies submit grant applications to PHMSA requesting funds for proposed activities. PHMSA reviews and evaluates applications to ensure the proposed activities support the program mission to ensure the safe transportation of hazmat. If approved, PHMSA offers the agency a Notice of Grant Award (NGA) for acceptance and signature. Once executed, the agency may distribute grant funds within the State, Territory, or Tribe to Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs) and first responder organizations; see Appendix A. The HMEP grant award amount during the 2007-2008 grant cycle was \$12.8 million; award amounts thereafter were increased to \$21.8 million.

SPSTG funding is provided to non-profit employee organizations engaged solely in fighting fires for the purpose of training instructors to conduct hazardous materials response training programs for individuals with statutory responsibility to respond to hazardous materials accidents and incidents. The International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) has been awarded this grant to increase the number of hazmat emergency response trainers nationwide who provide instruction to the largest number of fire fighters and emergency first responders at the local level. This program ensures hazmat awareness and operations training is available in the most convenient, cost-effective locations by allowing graduating instructors to train new, local instructors and

responders, while also guaranteeing continuity and efficiency. These training and planning grants are used to develop, improve, and implement emergency plans; train public sector hazmat emergency response employees to respond to accidents and incidents involving hazmat; determine flow patterns of hazmat within a State and between States; and determine the need within a State for regional hazmat emergency response teams. The SPSTG award amount during the 2007-2008 grant cycle was \$250,000; award amounts thereafter were increased to \$1 million.

In 2005, the Safe Accountable Flexible Efficient Transportation Equity Act: Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) authorized the Secretary of Transportation to implement a third, HMIT, grant program. Instituted during the 2008-2009 grant cycle, this program is open to non-profit hazmat employee organizations demonstrating expertise in conducting train-the-trainer programs for employees. A hazmat employee, as defined under the Hazardous Materials Regulations (HMR; 49 CFR Parts 171-180), is a person who, in the course of full time, part time, or temporary employment, directly affects hazmat transportation safety. Hazmat employees include self-employed persons—including owner/operators of motor vehicles, vessels, or aircraft, and railroad signalmen and maintenance-of-way employees. The term includes a person who:

- (1) Loads, unloads, or handles hazmat;
- (2) Designs, manufactures, fabricates, inspects, marks, maintains, reconditions, repairs, or tests a package, container or packaging component that is represented, marked, certified, or sold as qualified for use in transporting hazmat in commerce;
- (3) Prepares hazmat for transportation;
- (4) Is responsible for the safety of transporting hazmat; or
- (5) Operates a vehicle used to transport hazmat.

Approximately \$4 million per year is available for the HMIT program. Individual union award amounts are determined by the evaluation and scoring of applications through a competitive process. In FY 2008, there were three union recipients, and in FY 2009, a fourth recipient was added.

In addition to funding planning and training grants, registration fees are used for monitoring and technical assistance, curriculum development, and other administrative costs. Monitoring and technical assistance includes grantee site visits; conference attendance and participation; and contractor support for the development of outreach, evaluation, and other materials. The program provides funding to the National Fire Administration to assist in the development of the National Fire Protection (NFPA) 472 Curriculum and related materials. The NFPA 472 is the standard for competence of first responders who respond to hazmat accidents or incidents. Funds also are used for administrative purposes, including staff salaries. Lastly, registration fees fund the publication and distribution of the Emergency Response Guidebook (ERG). The ERG is used by firefighters, police, and other emergency services personnel who may be the first to arrive at the scene of a transportation incident involving hazmat. It is primarily a guide to aid first responders in (1) quickly identifying the specific or generic classification of the material(s) involved in the incident, and (2) protecting themselves and the general public during this initial response phase of the incident.

As mandated by 49 U.S.C. 5116(k), the Secretary of Transportation is required to submit to Congress annual reports covering the grant program administered by PHMSA. A grant period begins October 1 and ends on September 30 of the following year. Grantees are then afforded a 90-day grace period, through December 31, to submit invoices and satisfy all PHMSA reporting requirements. This report fulfills the reporting requirement for grants awarded in FY 2007 and used during FY 2008, grants awarded in FY 2008 and used during FY 2009, and grants awarded in FY 2009 and used during FY 2010. PHMSA acknowledges the late submission of these reports. Since 2009, the grant program has been engaged in reviews and audits requiring significant staff involvement. With a team of three personnel, the program was unable to meet its submission deadlines for the 2007-2009 Reports to Congress. The grant team staffing increased to seven personnel in late 2010. To expedite submission of the three outstanding reports (2007-2008, 2008-2009, and 2009-2010), all are included in this report. The hazmat grant program is committed to providing timely submission of the 2010-2011, and all future, Reports to Congress.

II. GRANT BUDGET AND ADMINISTRATION

A. The total grant program budget for FY 2007 was \$14.3 million. Federal hazmat law authorization and the annual appropriations specify broad funding allocations for program activities. The table below details allocations for FY 2007:

B. Training and Planning Grants Awarded in FY 2007 and Used in FY 2008. In FY 2007, PHMSA awarded \$12.8 million in grants to States, Territories, and Tribes and \$250,000 thousand to IAFF. Unexpended funds were deobligated at the end of the grant period. Approximately \$2.2 million in deobligated FY 2007 grant funds were returned to the program account for inclusion in the FY 2008 awards. The inclusion of unused funds in the following year's budget augments shortfalls in registration fee collections. In the event collected registration fees exceed what is necessary to fully fund the grant program, fees are reduced to absorb the surplus, as was done during 2003-2006. A summary of grant outputs is summarized in section III, Accomplishments.

The HMEP grant program requires grantees—States, Territories, and Tribes—to pass funds through to local emergency responders, or sub-grantees, for planning and training purposes. It is the grantees' responsibility to document all funds passed through to sub-grantees and other entities, and monitor sub-grantee activities.

Details of grant award amounts, disbursements, and deobligations for each State, Territory, Tribe, and IAFF are provided in Appendix B.

C. The total grant program budget for FY 2008 was \$28.3 million. Federal hazmat law authorization and the annual appropriations specify broad funding allocations for program activities. The table below details allocations for FY 2008:

D. Training and Planning Grants Awarded in FY 2008 and used in FY 2009. In FY 2008, PHMSA awarded \$21.8 million in HMEP grants to States, Territories, Tribes; \$4 million to HMIT; and \$1 million to IAFF. Unexpended funds were deobligated at the end of the grant period. Approximately \$4.5 million in deobligated FY 2008 grant funds were returned to the program account for inclusion in the FY 2009 awards.

Grant outputs are summarized below. Details of grant award amounts, and disbursements, for each State, Territory, Tribe, IAFF, and Union are provided in Appendix C.

E. The total grant program budget for FY 2009 was \$28.3 million. Federal hazmat law authorization and the annual appropriations specify broad funding allocations for program activities. The table below details allocations for FY 2009:

F. Training and Planning Grants Awarded in FY 2009 and used in FY 2010. In FY 2009, PHMSA awarded \$21.8 million in HMEP grants to States, Territories, Tribes; \$4 million to HMIT; and \$1 million to IAFF. FY 2009 funds are scheduled to be deobligated in September 2011.

Details of grant award amounts, and disbursements, for each State, Territory, Tribe, IAFF, and Union are provided in Appendix D.

G. Post-Award Adjustments Noted in Appendices A through D. During the period of performance, the program allows for adjustments to grantees' budgets, as needed, for training and planning programs. These adjustments are reflected as corresponding debits and credits to training and planning award amounts. Additionally, a grantee may determine that funds were requested in error. These adjustments, identified either during an audit or by the grantee, result in funds returned to PHMSA. During the 2007–2010 grant periods, funds returned during a given cycle, regardless of the period in which they were allocated, were credited to the grantees' awards for the active period, resulting in higher planning and training budgets than originally awarded.

III. ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The program affords grantees some flexibility in their training and planning activities, allowing them to tailor their programs to meet the needs of their local communities. Currently, PHMSA collects statistical output measures from grantees; however, the program is evaluating alternative measures to better assess the program's efficacy.

For FYs 2007, 2008, and 2009, respectively, the following grantee-supplied figures depict grantee reported outputs and examples of the program's impact on communities:

A. HMEP Outputs for FY 2007. During FY 2007, more than 153,000 emergency responders were trained using HMEP grant funds. HMEP grantees train to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 472 standard. Individual grantee training programs were not evaluated, as this curriculum is well documented and accepted as the standard competence of responders to hazmat incidents. By supporting a standardized, accepted, and proven program for use by all grantees, PHMSA ensures a higher level of efficacy of grantee training programs. The program continues to monitor developments in hazmat training. A summary of the number of emergency responders trained—as reported—by States, Territories, and Tribes is detailed below, with more information provided in Appendix E².

Grantees are responsible for submitting the number of eligible planning activities performed during a budget period. The following is a summary of those activities performed with FY 2007 funding, with more information provided in Appendix F³:

- Developed and updated more than 3,700 emergency response plans—note LEPCs may
 update multiple plans to allow for the inclusion of a transportation perspective in fixedfacility planning,
- Performed approximately 800 emergency response exercises, and
- Performed more than 300 Commodity Flow Studies.⁴

² Individual responders may be trained at multiple levels (i.e., awareness, operations, etc.,) during a grant period. Appendix E reflects the number of responders trained at each level.

³ Grantees may perform allowable planning activities that are not captured in the standard report template.

During the 2007–2008 grant cycle, Iowa wrote the following regarding HMEP's impact on its communities:

"Over the past several years, HMEP grant dollars have taken a program that was dormant due to lack of funding and transformed it into a successful planning, training, and exercise program. HMEP planning funds have been instrumental in enabling local jurisdictions to:

- Finish incomplete community multi-hazard hazardous materials plans [in Iowa, these are typically developed as an annex to each county's comprehensive emergency operations plan];
- Improve existing hazardous materials annexes;
- Upgrade these plans under EPCRA to include the determination of hazardous materials flow patterns within Iowa and between Iowa and bordering states.

With the experience gained during previous HMEP budget periods, transportation flow studies, which were once found to be costly and difficult to manage, are now conducted on a routine basis by various jurisdictions located throughout Iowa. Due to the importance of such information to prepare for potential hazardous materials transportation accidents, and because of the perishability of this type of data, further funding for continued research in this area is very important."

B. HMEP Outputs for FY 2008. During FY 2008, more than 122,000 emergency responders were trained using HMEP grant funds. A summary of the number of responders trained—as reported—by States, Territories, and Tribes is detailed below, with more information provided in Appendix G.

The following is a summary of reported eligible planning activities performed with FY 2008 funding, with more information provided in Appendix H:

- Developed approximately 300 emergency plans,
- Updated more than 1,100 emergency response plans—note LEPCs may update multiple plans to allow for the inclusion of a transportation perspective in fixed-facility planning, and
- Performed approximately 1,000 emergency response exercises.

Grantees have demonstrated comprehensive approaches to addressing specific hazmat transportation needs. During the 2008–2009 grant cycle, California reported that, in a time of tightening fiscal budgets, the HMEP Grant offers assistance and encourages both resource leveraging and coordination of priorities across hazmat response stakeholder organizations.

"State agency and local government training and exercising has improved joint response efforts by addressing such issues as inter-agency policy, jurisdictional authority, consensus decision making and action planning... The entire state is faced with budget cuts, downsizing and finding creative ways to meet these challenges. Local governments are struggling during these difficult times to meet the needs of the state. The can do attitude is alive and we all realize the mission must go on. The HMEP Grant provides resources, training, opportunity and hope."

C. HMEP Outputs for FY 2009. During FY 2009, nearly 100,000 emergency responders were trained using HMEP grant funds. A summary of the number of responders trained—as reported—by States, Territories, and Tribes is detailed below, with more information provided in Appendix I.

The following is a summary of reported eligible planning activities performed with FY 2009 funding, with more information provided in Appendix J:

- Developed more than 250 emergency plans,
- Updated more than 1,000 emergency response plans—note LEPCs may update multiple plans to allow for the inclusion of a transportation perspective in fixed-facility planning, and
- Performed approximately 900 emergency response exercises.

Grantees often indicate that HMEP funding not only is an important resource for their programs, but is one of the few programs poised to meet the unique hazmat transportation needs of smaller or underserved counties. Although HMEP programs provide funding directly to Native American Tribal grantees, other Tribes within the state benefit as well.

During the 2009–2010 grant cycle, Arizona reported that HMEP funds were used to initiate a Commodity Flow Study of Interstate 17, along the northern portion of Arizona in Navajo County. Navajo County is home to three federally recognized Indian Reservations including the Navajo, Hopi, and Fort Apache. Navajo County contains 6,600 square miles of Indian Reservations within its borders—the third largest county of Indian Reservations within the U.S.

D. SPSTG (IAFF) Outputs for FY2007, 2008, and 2009. SPSTGs were awarded to IAFF for all three grant cycles to fund and increase the number of hazmat emergency response trainers nationwide. IAFF is a nationwide non-profit organization whose members are engaged solely in fire fighting, rescue, and emergency medical services. The IAFF has a coordinated HMEP instructor training program for hazmat emergency response trainers including the evaluation of these training programs for short- and long-term knowledge retention.

IAFF reported during the 2007-2008 grant cycle that approximately 197 trainers were trained with an award amount of \$250,000. The IAFF achieved 216 percent of its training goals by conducting 13 HMEP instructor training events, seven more than originally projected.

The IAFF reported during the 2008-2009 grant cycle that approximately 1,197 trainers were trained with an award amount of \$1 million. The IAFF conducted train-the-trainer courses,

offered supportive teaching sessions that aided local trainers by testing competencies to ensure effective knowledge transfer, and achieved 145 percent of its aggressive training goals for this period.

The IAFF reported during the 2009-2010 grant cycle that approximately 829 trainers were trained with an award amount of \$1 million. The IAFF increased their train-the-trainer curriculum from a 1-day, 8-hour session to a 2-day, 16-hour session, which resulted in fewer, albeit more in-depth, offerings during the budget period. IAFF met its goal by conducting 15 instructor train-the-trainer classes and 17 supportive teaching sessions, despite their implementation of a new, more robust, 16-hour train-the-trainer program.

E. HMIT Outputs for FY2008 and 2009. HMIT grants are awarded to non-profit hazmat organizations to fund train-the trainer instruction to hazmat employees. Grantees reported approximately 2,866 trainers were trained during the 2008-2009 grant cycle, and 2,944 trainers were trained during the 2009-2010 grant cycle. HMIT grantees also demonstrate program productivity. The International Association of Machinist and Aerospace Workers' Corporation for Re-Employment (IAM C.R.E.S.T.) is a non-profit organization designed to provide job reentry and safety training services for professionals in the field. During the 2008-2009 grant cycle, IAM C.R.E.S.T. developed a Hazardous Materials Awareness train-the trainer program. The curriculum prioritizes and targets the needs of airlines and airport employees. As reported by IAM C.R.E.S.T. during the 2009–2010 grant cycle, more than 80 percent of hazmat workers believed this training added value to their work. Other organizational training resulted in a 98 percent decrease in hazmat incidents. IAM C.R.E.S.T. expects to realize similar benefits for those trained with HMIT funds.

IV. CONCLUSIONS

In FY 2009, PHMSA conducted an internal program evaluation that revealed several areas needing improvement. In FY 2010, PHMSA sought the assistance of a contractor, specializing in grant programs to assess the efficacy of the program. Later in FY 2010, PHMSA was notified by the Department's Office of Inspector General (OIG) that they would conduct an audit of the program. Although the OIG's audit has not yet concluded, PHMSA established and launched a comprehensive action plan to address and enhance several key areas of policy, operations, and support. These improvement efforts will establish greater accountability of operations, oversight of grantees including reevaluating of types of data collected from grantees, and improved efficiencies ensuring that the program: 1) develops and implements effective standard operating procedures; 2) has appropriate levels of staff and support resources; 3) leverages on-line information technology management systems; and 4) standardizes grantee applications, reports, and review processes. To address the issue of deobligation, PHMSA is providing clarification on allowable program expenses and educating grantees on best practices. PHMSA has increased program monitoring, which includes site visits and desk reviews, to ensure grantees are making efficient use of grant funds.

PHMSA continues to make significant progress in reforming the program; however, the agency acknowledges it may take several grant cycles to fully realize these improvements. Progress continues on these and other efforts to improve the efficacy of PHMSA's grant program

including implementation of grantee training program evaluations, and the development of additional guidance on effective uses of planning funds.


