 Every operational strategy must account for populations with special needs.



 Evacuations of special needs individuals from an evacuation area may require utilization of public transportation resources.



Evacuation Strategy: Homebound Evacuation Operation (HEO) New York City Office of Emergency Management (NYCOEM)

 The HEO coordinates evacuation assistance for homebound individuals with disabilities with no other options for evacuation.



Evacuation Strategy: Homebound Evacuation Operation (HEO) New York City Office of Emergency Management (NYCOEM)

| Medical Issue | Description | Transportation Asset | Final Destination |
|---------------|--|--|--------------------------------|
| 1. Stretcher | Unable to leave home on their own; unable to travel in a sitting position (require stretcher transport) | Ambulance | Hospital |
| 2. Wheelchair | Unable to leave home on their own; able to sit for an extended period of time (can travel on a bus) | Department of Education school bus with Firefighter Transport Team | Hurricane Evacuation Center |
| 3. Ambulatory | Able to leave home with assistance (can get to the curb); disabilities prevent use of public transportation for evacuation | Paratransit | Hurricane Evacuation Center |



Evacuation Strategy: Healthcare Evacuation Center (HEC) New York City Office of Emergency Management (NYCOEM)

 HEC coordinates the Healthcare Facility (HCF) Evacuation Plan for the evacuation of hospitals, nursing homes, adult care facilities, and psychiatric facilities.



 To maximize the number of evacuations of people with medical/special needs the distance and time required to reach the Evacuation Centers must be optimally short.



 Must establish policies to allow pets and define limitations for carry-on items otherwise evacuees will remain at the evacuation area.



Evacuation Response Assessment

• Command decision to evacuate must be timely and considerate of the shut down of services to protect assets for recovery.



Evacuation Response Assessment

- Communication with other agencies/customers
- Employee Safety and Deployment
- Accounting of all evacuees transported from evacuation area
- Asset/Resource Evaluation prior to mobilization for recovery



Evacuation Response Assessment

- Fueling/Power Supplies
- Improvements in System/Facility/Equipment Protection & Recovery
- Use of photographs/video before and after emergency
- Management of Emergency Resources
- Restoration of regular service
