



WETLANDS MAPS








APPENDIX M FLOOD INSURANCE RATE MAPS




A negative result (no record in our database) does not mean that a sensitive species is not present. Our data can only tell you of known occurrences, based on information gathered by qualified biologists and reported to our office. However, many areas have never been surveyed, or have only been surveyed for certain species. For some purposes, including legal requirements for state wetland permits, the fact that no species of concern are known to be present is sufficient. However, an on-site survey would provide better information on what species and communities are indeed present.

The NHFG Nongame and Endangered Species Program has reviewed NHB10-0341 for the proposed North Fire Station on Grenier Field Road in Londonderry. The NHB review indicated that the state endangered eastern hognose snake and Blanding's turtle have been documented in the vicinity of the site. Blanding's turtle and eastern hognose snake are protected by RSA 212-A, the New Hampshire Endangered Species Conservation Act. Based on the size, location and quality of the site for the presence of these two species, we do not expect impacts to Blanding's turtle or eastern hognose as a result of this specific project. However, impacts to other lots in the vicinity of the project may result in adverse impacts to these two protected species and would require review from the NHFG Nongame and Endangered Species Program. Kim,

As discussed this morning, I am requesting that you please review the above referenced file. The Town of Londonderry has applied for and has been granted financial assistance through the Assistance to Firefighters Station Construction Grant by the Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency. Grant money will be used to construct a new North Fire Station on the subject lot.

Historically, the subject lot was two separate parcels used for residential purposes. The Town acquired the lots in 1999 and 2006 for the construction of a new North Fire Station, the lots have been consolidated by the Town. In 2005 / 2006 the Town began performing site work activities (clearing, grubbing, earth work, utilities and drainage) for the new station. Approximately 80% of the 2 acre parcel will be disturbed as a result of the new station.

There were and are no wetlands or vernal pools on the site. The construction of the new North Fire Station will not require an Alteration of Terrain Permit (less than 100k sf disturbance) or a wetlands permit.




Figure 1. Project Area on USGS Manchester South Quadrangle (1:24,000)




Figure 2. Project Plans (Approximate Scale 1" = 70')
