Exams – *written tests administered via Blackboard designed to measure knowledge and application of presented course module material.*

End of Chapter Quizzes – *written quizzes administered via Blackboard designed to measure knowledge and application of the week's presented material.*

Beginning the Proposal - *written essay designed to begin the process of constructing a research proposal.*

Research Proposal – *written assignment designed to culminate in the course material and test the student's ability to critically analyze said material.*

Class Discussions – *weekly participation in class discussion forums.*

I am very interested in the feedback I get from students, as I work to continually improve my teaching. I consider the SETE to be an important part of your participation in this class.

Assignment Policy:

Exams - Three exams will be given over the course of the semester. Each exam will consist of a combination of multiple choice questions, short answers, and essays.

Pre Quiz – Each non-Exam week, a pre-quiz will be given in order to prepare the student adequately for the end of the chapter quiz. **NOTE: The pre-quizzes are not for a grade, HOWEVER, the student is highly encouraged to complete the pre-quiz each week prior to the end of chapter quiz. Specifically, each student is suggested to complete the pre-quiz and score a 100% completion each week prior to beginning the end of week chapter quiz as they will prepare the student for success on the later graded quiz.** Each pre-quiz will consist of 5 questions. You have as many attempts as necessary to complete a 100%. **Thus, if you do not do well the first time, you may try and try again!!! Each pre-quiz will open on Monday each week.** There are no time limits for the pre-quizzes.

End of Chapter Quizzes – Each non-Exam week, an end of the chapter quiz will be given via Blackboard. Each quiz will consist of multiple choice questions and short answers. **You will only have one attempt at each end of the chapter quiz.** The questions will be given one at a time and you will be allowed to revisit previous questions. End of the chapter quizzes will only open upon successful completion of the week's pre-quiz. **Each end of chapter quiz must be completed NO LATER than 5pm on the scheduled Sunday due date!!!** There are no time limits for the end of chapter quizzes.

Beginning the Proposal - There is a writing assignment required in this course. The assignment requires the student to identify a research topic of interest and answer (in one or two sentence responses) a number of questions regarding said topic. This assignment serves as the framework for the final research proposal.

Research Proposal - The final project required in this course is a research proposal. The assignment requires the student to create a research design based on the topic chosen. **The proposal will be created in parts, with the Introduction, Literature Review sections being created first followed by the Methods and Conclusion sections.** Examples of the sections as well as a research proposal will be made available to students in Blackboard. The assignments must be TYPED with **12 point Times New Roman font, 1 inch margins, and Double Spaced.** The final copy of the Research Proposal must include the following information:

- 1) Title page
- 2) Introduction
- 3) Literature Review
- 4) Proposed Methods
- 5) Conclusion (i.e., Expected Findings)
- 6) And an added Reference page using **Proper APA citation!!!** (Use the resources made available for APA). Note this needs to be on a separate page and be the last page of the proposal.

Class Discussions – Weekly class discussion forums will make up part of the final grade. In order to receive the full credit, each student is required to be PREPARED (having read the required readings –text, lecture slides) prior to participating in the weekly forum discussions. Using the assigned reading material as a foundation, each student is to view the link for “**Crime Story of the Week**”. After completion of the video each student must:

- 1) Answer the week’s thread question as it applies to the news video (**worth 5 points per week**).
- 2) Respond to another student’s posting related to the video (**worth 5 points per week**).
 - a. Must identify which thread post you are responding to!!
 - b. Confirm or contradict an assertion made from a classmates post and explain why.

NOTE: Each thread post must be 5 or more sentences.

If the student is prepared and participates with both responses each week in the discussion forum, adhering to the above guidelines, they will receive full credit, if they are not prepared and participate they will receive partial credit, and/or if they do not complete both responses per week, lastly, if they do not participate they will receive no credit. **Note: extra credit may be earned each week for those students that add significantly to the discussion based on the material. This requires responses that go above and beyond the above guidelines.**

All class announcements will be posted on Blackboard, and/or sent via email. It is your responsibility to check Blackboard and your e-mail early and often. Ignorance to any posted announcement will not be an excuse.

Exam and Quiz Policy:

Exams should be taken as scheduled. Each QUIZ and EXAM must be completed in Blackboard **NO LATER than 5pm on the scheduled date**. **No late or makeup quizzes or examinations will be allowed** except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook). It is your responsibility to contact me during the first two weeks of class if there’s anything about which I should know concerning special accommodation for any of the assignments. I will try to work out a suitable arrangement, but I must know about it during the first two weeks of class.
