Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Article Summaries – weekly written summarizations of articles that supplement the week's material. Exams – written tests designed to measure knowledge and application of presented course material. Writing Assignment – written essay designed to reinforce course material and test the student's ability to critically analyze said material.

Journal – a journal for students to maintain that will serve as a constant summary of the course material. **Class Discussions** – daily attendance and participation in class discussions.

The Student Evaluation of Teaching Effectiveness (SETE) is a requirement for all organized classes at UNT. This short survey will be made available to you at the end of the semester, providing you a chance to comment on how this class is taught. I am very interested in the feedback I get from students, as I work to continually improve my teaching. I consider the SETE to be an important part of your participation in this class.

Assignment Policy:

Journal - Students' are required to keep and maintain a journal that includes a brief summary form (form will be passed out on first day of class) of each theory, a scholarly article that tests the week's theory (each of these articles will be disseminated by me) and a corresponding news article for each theory (student must find and provide).

Article Summary - Students will also be required to write a 2-3 page article summary each week. The articles will be given to the class by the instructor the week prior to discussion. Each article must be read and summarized prior to the scheduled week's class. The article summary will be turned in during class and serve as material for class discussions. Articles should be double spaced, 1 inch margins, and 12 point Times New Roman font. There are 11 article summaries, however, it should be noted that the number of article summaries due will be dependent on the flow of the class during the semester. The summaries should identify the author(s) key points and findings and provide critical consideration of how the work compares to the rest of the scheduled readings (agreements, contradictions, etc.). Additionally, it is required at the end of each summary that the articles proper citation be listed in APA format (see APA handbook for help). Finally, each student will provide one class discussion question about the article following the APA citation.

Exams - Two exams will be given over the course of the semester. Each exam will consist of a combination of multiple choice questions, short answers, and essays.

Writing Assignment - There is a writing assignment required in this course. The assignment requires the student to identify one of the theories discussed during the semester and write a minimum 5 page paper (see specifics below). As part of the paper, each student is required to locate a peer-reviewed journal article on the chosen theory topic. The assignment must be TYPED with <u>12 point Times New Roman font</u>, 1 inch margins, and Double Spaced. The paper must include the following information:

- 1) A copy of the article
- 2) Your name
- 3) Proper APA citation!!! (If you do not know APA come and talk to me during office hours)
- 4) Summarize the theory
- 5) Does the theory have macro, micro, or both, components
- 6) Identify the strengths and weaknesses of the theory
- 7) In a section discussing application of the theory:
 - *Summarize the article *Discuss how it ties into the chosen theory

Class Discussions - In class discussions will make up part of the final grade. In order to receive the full credit, each student is required to come to class PREPARED (having read the required assignments- text and article) and ACTIVELY participate in the discussion using the assigned reading material. If the student is prepared and participates in the discussion they will receive full credit, if they are not prepared and participate they will receive partial credit, and if they are absent or do not participate they will receive no credit.

All class announcements will be given during class lecture, posted on Blackboard, and/or sent via email. It is your responsibility to check Blackboard and your e-mail early and often. Ignorance to any posted announcement will not be an excuse.

Exam Policy:

Exams should be taken as scheduled. No makeup examinations will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook). It is your responsibility to contact me during the first two weeks of class if there's anything about which I should know concerning special accommodation for any of the assignments. I will try to work out a suitable arrangement, but I must know about it during the first two weeks of class. It is also your responsibility to bring me the required documentation(s) or have the responsible parties contact me in a timely manner for any kind of special accommodation for any of the assignments.

Academic Integrity:
