Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Exams – written tests designed to measure knowledge and application of presented course material. **Writing Assignment** – written essay designed to begin the process of the final proposal.

Beginning the Proposal - written essay designed to begin the process of constructing a research proposal. **Research Proposal** – written assignment designed to culminate in the course material and test the student's ability to critically analyze said material.

Class Discussions – daily attendance and participation in class discussions.

The Student Evaluation of Teaching Effectiveness (SETE) is a requirement for all organized classes at UNT. I am very interested in the feedback I get from students, as I work to continually improve my teaching. I consider the SETE to be an important part of your participation in this class.

Assignment Policy:

Exams - Three exams will be given over the course of the semester. Each exam will consist of a combination of multiple choice questions, short answers, and essays.

Beginning the Proposal - There is a writing assignment required in this course. The assignment requires the student to identify a research topic of interest and answer (in one or two sentence responses) a number of questions regarding said topic. This assignment serves as the framework for the final research proposal.

Research Proposal - The final project required in this course is a research proposal. The assignment requires the student to create a research design based on the topic chosen. The proposal will be created in parts, with the Introduction, Literature Review sections being created first followed by the Methods and Conclusion sections. Examples of the sections as well as a research proposal will be made available to students in class. The assignments must be TYPED with <u>12 point Times New Roman font, 1</u> inch margins, and Double Spaced. The final combined copy of the Research Proposal must include the following information:

- 1) Title page
- 2) Introduction
- 3) Literature Review
- 4) Proposed Methods
- 5) Conclusion (i.e., Expected Findings)
- 6) And an added Reference page using <u>Proper APA citation!!!</u> (Use the resources made available for APA). Note this needs to on a separate page and be the last page of the proposal.

Class Discussions - In class discussions will make up a portion of the final grade. In order to receive the full credit, each student is required to come to class PREPARED (having read the required assignments) and ACTIVELY participate in the discussion using the assigned reading material. If the student is prepared and participates in the discussion they will receive full credit, if they are not prepared and participate they will receive partial credit, and if they are absent or do not participate they will receive no credit.

All class announcements will be given during class lecture, posted on Blackboard, and/or sent via email. It is your responsibility to check Blackboard and your e-mail early and often. Ignorance to any posted announcement will not be an excuse.

Exam Policy:

Exams should be taken as scheduled. No makeup examinations will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook). It is your responsibility to contact me during the first two weeks of class if there's anything about which I should know concerning special accommodation for any of the assignments. I will try to work out a suitable arrangement, but I must know about it during the first two weeks of class. It is also your responsibility to bring me the required documentation(s) or have the responsible parties contact me in a timely manner for any kind of special accommodation for any of the assignments.
