Exam Policy:

The exams may consist of multiple choice, true-false, definitional, descriptive, listing, and/or short answer questions. The first examination is tentatively scheduled for **Thursday, May 17**. There will be <u>no make-up exams</u> unless you have a university-recognized emergency, notify me prior to the exam that you will have to reschedule, and provide appropriate documentation of the emergency.

Exams will be given at the start of each class session. You will have an hour to complete the exam once it starts. No additional time will be given if you are late. There is typically a bonus question on each exam. However, if you are late for an exam that has a bonus question on it, you will forfeit the privilege to receive those points.

We will be doing in class group work at various times throughout the term; however, it is ungraded and is intended for class discussion and study purposes. If you miss a class with a group assignment, please coordinate with a classmate to get the work you missed. The assignments themselves will be posted on Blackboard after the day in which they are discussed. On occasion we will also be utilizing videos during the class as an additional teaching tool, and the material covered in the videos is subject to being tested. You must be present in class to view the videos; these will not be available online or in the library.

Incompletes:

- (1) the student has completed 3/4 of the class
