<b>Course Goals or Overview:</b>	
	This course focuses on substantive criminal law: i.e., basic crimes and criminal defenses. In this connection, we will explore the traditional common law and Texas statutory definitions of the crimes and defenses.
<b>Learning Objectives/Outcomes:</b> At the end of this course, the student will be able to:	
1	Define the elements of Texas and common law crimes
2	Differentiate between common law and statutory definitions
3	Evaluate different fact scenarios and apply the elements of crimes to those facts
4	Demonstrate how to research and locate applicable statutes, including those under consideration by the Texas Legislature (during semesters when the legislature is in session)

## Course Schedule and Requirements

*This schedule is subject to change by the instructor. Any changes to this schedule will be communicated via announcements in Blackboard. You are also responsible for reading through the course information on Blackboard.*

- Unit 1 (located inside the “Start Here” tab) is an introduction to the course. There is an introductory quiz about the online environment and the syllabus that must be completed with a score of 20 before you can begin the academic content section of the course (this counts as your first quiz grade, so everyone gets an A out of the gate – after that, it’s up to you).
- The academic content contains 4 modules with units (chapters) within each module. Each unit has its own readings, assignments, and quiz; and each module has its own discussion and exam. You will not be able to take the module exam until you have completed at least one attempt on all the unit quizzes within the module.
- The exam grade will NOT be counted into your final average, but you must achieve at least **70%** in order to get credit for the points earned for the quizzes and discussions within that module.
- Quizzes may be taken an unlimited number of times before the deadlines. You may take the exam for each module twice as long as you complete it before the deadlines below.
- If you pace yourself, you will complete more or less one unit per week (with some slight variations). Module course material will remain available throughout the course after the module becomes available, but the discussions, quizzes, and exams will only be available through the deadline for each module.

**Module 1** – Module 1 consists of Units 2-5 and begins after the introduction quiz at the beginning of the course; Module quizzes, exam, and discussion must be completed no later than **11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, February 10.**

**Module 2** – Module 2 consists of Units 6-8 and begins at 12:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 11; Module quizzes, exam, and discussion must be completed no later than **11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, March 9.**

**Module 3** – Module 3 consists of Units 9-11 and begins at 12:00 a.m. on Thursday, March 10; Module quizzes, exam, and discussion must be completed no later than **11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, April 13.**

**Module 4** – Module 4 consists of Units 12-15 and begins at 12:00 a.m. on Thursday, April 14; Module quizzes, exam, and discussion must be completed no later than **11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, May 11.**

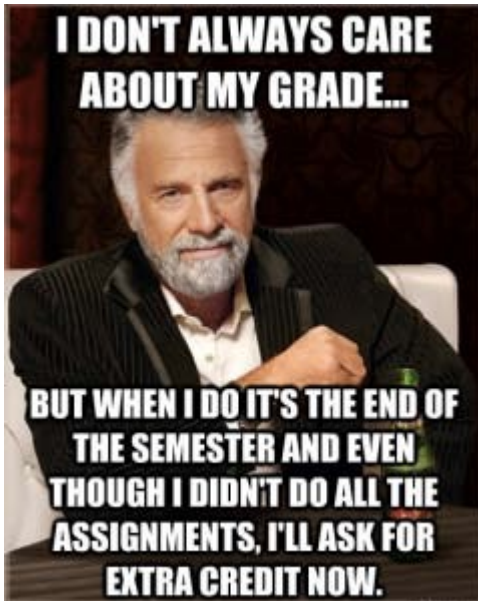
**Incompletes:**

## Assignments for the Course

### Legislative Inquiry Assignment:

*For this assignment, you will locate two bills that have been proposed to affect Texas criminal law (adding a new crime, changing the definition of a current crime, or affecting the punishment of an offense).*

*For each of the bills you select, you will write an analytical paper that has two major parts:*

- 1. General information about the bill*
- 2. Your personal analysis of the bill*

*Further details for this assignment, including guidelines and a rubric, are provided in the course page in Blackboard labeled "Legislative Inquiry."*

### Online Discussions:

*Students will be randomly placed into online groups for each module. Within each online group, each student is required to create an original response to the module prompt, as well as responding to three of their peers. If none of your peers have created any original posts but you have, I will assume your good intention to respond and will assess you accordingly. If your peers HAVE posted, good intentions earn you nothing if you don't respond.*

*Your responses should be thoughtful and demonstrate insight into the question based on course content. Responses to your peers can agree or disagree, but must provide insight into why your perspective is similar or different. Challenge yourselves and your classmates to think from perspectives other than your own.*

*Nothing in this policy is intended to limit or restrict lively debate or discussion of additional topics of interest to the class, so long as students remain respectful. **Discussions unrelated to the module should be kept separate from the module discussions – please use the general Q&A board for this purpose.** Please remain on topic within each thread of discussion (responding to a specific thread within the thread, rather than responding or starting a different thread to respond).*
