Exam Policy:

Exams should be taken as scheduled.

There will be five (5) exams. Each exam will be worth up to 100 points (10% each) toward a student's final grade in the course.

Discussion Board: Each student will be required to post to five different discussion board postings during the semester. The discussion board topics will be over the American legal system. Each student will be required to post to the discussion question asked and then reply to two other student's posts. Postings will be graded

according to the Critical Thinking Value and Written Communication Value in each posting. The three discussion board postings will count (5% each) toward a student's final grade in the course.

Exit Exam:

Students are required to take the exit exam at the end of the semester. The exam is a comprehensive exam over three areas of criminal justice. The exam will consist of 50 multiple choice questions over the court system, the police, and corrections. The exit exam will be taken on a date assigned by the instructor and will count (5%) toward the student's final grade in the course.
