Assignment Information:

Unit Exams – There will be four unit exams in this course. Each unit exam will cover course content from that particular unit. Unit exams will consist of a combination of multiple choice, true-false, fill-in-the-blank, and short answer questions.

Response Paper – Students will be asked to critically analyze an assigned topic and produce a 4-6 page response paper that addresses a number of specific questions provided by the professor.

Discussion Board – Students will be required to respond to 4 discussion board topics during the semester. The discussion board topics will correspond to content covered in each unit. Students will be required to post a detailed response to the topic and then reply to 3 other students' posts. Both the quantity and quality of participation will be evaluated. Quality responses should engage with both the topic and other students' thoughts on the topic, and include rationale, examples, and evidence (if applicable) to support one's view.

Late Policy:

Assignments should be submitted as scheduled. No makeups will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook).
