**Exam Grading Policy:** Exams must be taken as scheduled. No makeup examinations will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook). There will be four scheduled exams that will be based on class lectures, selected chapters in the textbook, and any additional readings / information assigned in class. Exams will cover four different criminal justice topics (measuring crime, the police, the courts, and

corrections). Exams will be a combination of multiple choice, true-false questions. Each exam will count 20% (100 points) toward a student's final grade.

**Out of Class Assignment:** Each student will be required to write a reaction paper. The reaction paper will count 10% (0-50 points) toward a student's final grade. The paper will be graded according to the Critical Thinking Value and Written Communication Value. Information on the assignment can be found inside the Course Materials link. Five points will be taken off for each day the assignment is late.

**Electronic Discussion Board:** Each student will be required to post to four different electronic discussion board postings during the semester. The electronic discussion board topics will be over measuring crime, the police, corrections, and American legal system. Each student will be required to post to the discussion question asked and then reply to two other student's posts. Postings will be graded according to the Critical Thinking Value and Written Communication Value in each posting. The four discussion board postings will count up to 12.5 points each (10%) toward a student's final grade in the course.
