Course Catalog Description:	The study methods of obtaining and reporting information from the crime scene, victims, witnesses and suspects. Specific attention is given to investigation of index crimes (homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, arson, motor vehicle theft and larceny. Prerequisite(s): CJUS 2100, CJUS 3201 and CJUS 3300 or equivalents. (3 hrs.)

Course Goals or Overview:	
	The goal of this course is for students to understand how important criminal investigation plays in the development of our criminal justice system.
Learning Objectives/Outcomes: (All outcomes below align with the INTASC standards)	
To achieve these objectives this class will:	
1	Introduce you to theories related to basic investigative responsibilities.
2	Examine the various perspectives relevant to conduct a criminal investigation.
3	Examine the proof required to investigate various crimes.
4	Demonstrate and understand methods used to perform a criminal investigation.

5	Examine various witness and victim interviewing techniques.
6	Examine investigative techniques used in investigating index crimes.
7	Introduce you to the process of writing an effective report.
8	Introduce you to different types of forensic / physical evidence at a crime scene.
9	Examine various methods of documenting the crime scene, note taking, photographing and sketching a crime scene.
10	Examine various methods of obtaining information and intelligence in criminal investigation.

Examination Policy

There will be (2) examinations over selected chapters from the textbook. Each examinations will come from selected chapters in the textbook and worth 200 points toward the student's final grade.

- What questions does the video(s) and article(s) raise for you about Investigative techniques?
- What would you tell the victims if you had a chance?
- When considering what you have learned, what would you like to see changed if anything in our criminal justice system?

An out of class assignment will be assigned and presented to the class during the semester. The out of class assignment / presentation will count 1/3rd percent toward the student's final grade.
