#### **Course Evaluation Methods**

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

\*Attendance – Class attendance is required. I will take attendance for every class. Students who are absent from class will have three (3) point s deducted from their final grade for each class that the student does not attend.

**Exams** – Four (4) exams will be given. The exams are worth 90% of your final grade.

#### \*I will deduct five (5) points from the final grade of those students who are late for an exam.

#### \*I will deduct five (5) points from the final grade of those who turn in an exam late.

**Class Participation** – Class Participation points constitute 10% of your grade. Participation means being prepared to answer when called on by the instructor to answer questions relevant to the chapters and/or topics discussed in class. Class Participation also means contributing to class discussions. Points will be deducted for students who are disruptive to the class. Students who do not participate in class discussions and/or students who are not prepared to answer questions when called upon by instructor will not receive class participation points. Students who are absent for class will not be able to receive the maximum number of class participation points.
