Course Goals or Overview:			
	Exploration of the scope of ethics. Review of where ethics come from, different ethical systems and whether ethics are permanent or changeable. Class will also explore the following: what it means to tell a lie, are there good lies, police subculture and whether police subculture is learned as well as the noble cause, ethical issues facing courts, ethical issues facing correctional officers, and whistle blowing.

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Exams – Three (3) exams will be given. Each exam is worth 25% of your final grade for a total of 75%.

Paper – You will be required to write a paper that will constitute 15% of your final grade. A handout will be given in class with information on possible topics as well as requirements.

Class Participation – Class Participation points constitute 10% of your grade. Participation means being prepared to answer when called on by the instructor to answer questions relevant to the chapters and/or topics discussed in class. Class Participation also means contributing to class discussions. Points will be deducted for students who are disruptive to the class. Students who do not participate in class discussions and/or students who are not prepared to answer questions when called upon by instructor will not receive class participation points.
