<b>Course Goals or Overview:</b>			
The goal of this course is to give student a better understanding of how law enforcement, the courts, and Corrections work together in the criminal justice system.			
<b>Learning Objectives/Outcomes:</b> At the end of this course, the student will			
1	Be able to define crime and explain different aspects of crime.		
2	Be able to explain how crime is measured.		
3	Understand the history of law enforcement and the challenges of effective policing.		
4	Identify and discuss the rules of law enforcement.		

5	Understand the elements of the criminal court system when considering punishment and sentencing in today's criminal justice system.
6	Understand the different aspects of the corrections systems which include probation, community corrections, prisons, jails and the inmate.
7	Be able to explain the six general jobs categories among correctional officers.

**Course Evaluation Methods:** A student's final grade will be calculated from the following means.

- four examinations given over material covered in the required textbook
- one information quiz
- four discussion board postings
- one practical exercise

**Chapter Quiz Policy:** There will be (4) different chapter unit quizzes over selected chapters from the textbook in each unit. The online part I of the quizzes will be timed and you will have 1 hour (60 min.) complete the quiz. Do not leave the quiz for reason and do not have long periods of non-activity inside the quiz for blackboard will lock you out automatically.

Remember each unit chapter assignment has a completion date.

- Each quiz will come from selected chapters in the textbook.
- Each quiz will consist of questions both multiple choice, true-false and short answer.
- Each quiz will be broken down into two parts.
- Part I will have a mix of (30) multiple choice and true-false questions worth 2 point each.
- Part II will have (20) short answer questions worth 2 points each. (your answers must be placed on an answer form furnished by the instructor and attached to a message sent to me via the Message Link).

Quizzes must be taken as scheduled. No makeup quiz will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook). If a student gets locked out of a quiz he or she must me a message stating why you were locked out and I will unlock the quiz so that the student may take it over. I will only unlock one quiz during the semester and the unlocked quiz must be taken before the unit assignment closing date.

### Information Quiz:

The information quiz will come from all the material inside the Your Professor Link, the Start Here Link, and the Course Information Link. The quiz will consist of 20 questions worth 5 points each for up to 100 points toward a student's final grade in the course. The quiz will be timed and you will have 30 hour to complete the quiz.

### Discussion Board Postings:

Each student will be required to post to (4) different discussion board postings during the semester. The discussion board topics will correspond with information from each selected chapter in the textbook. Each student will be required to post to the discussion question asked and then reply to (3) other student's posts. **Postings will be graded according to the Critical Thinking Value and Written Communication Value in each posting.** The (4) discussion board postings will count up to (25) points each (for a total of 0 – 100 total points) toward a student's final grade. A completion date will be posted on each discussion question located inside the Discussion Board link.

**Discussion Board Grading:** Discussion board activities and any other grading activities will be graded within 48 hours after the closing of each unit. Instructor will also respond to student Blackboard questions within 24 hours of student posting in the Blackboard's messaging tool.

- 0 - 25 points for posting to each discussion question.
- 0 - 100 total points for the (4) discussion questions can be earned.
- 0 -10 total points for posting to each discussion board question.
- 0 - 15 total points for posting to 3 other student's posts. (0-5 points each)
