## Course Evaluation Methods

**Exams** – On-Line multiple choice/true and false exams designed to measure knowledge of presented course material. **Exams 1 and 2 will open on Thursday at 6pm and close on Monday at 8am. This will give you the weekend to complete it. The final exam will open on July 2, 2013 at 6pm and close at 9:50pm.**

**On-Line Forums**-Designed to encourage student engagement, discussion, and reinforce course material. **Forums will open at 6pm before class and close at 7pm. **Quizzes** – On-line multiple choice/true and false exams designed to measure knowledge of presented course material and reinforce the assigned readings.
