**Course Description:** ARTS 1300. Art Appreciation For Non–Art Majors. 3 hours. Introduction to basic concepts and vocabularies of the visual arts worldwide, designed to expand aesthetic growth and involvement with the visual world. For non-art majors only. Satisfies the Creative Arts requirement of the University Core Curriculum.

- 5. express how exposure to different ideas, perspectives, cultures and viewpoints has enriched their thinking

## Assignments:

- 1. Local Art Essay. Write a 3-4 paragraph paper about a work of art that is no more than one mile from your house. What function does the work serve? What do you know about the artist? How is it situated in its environment? What do you think about when you view it? Include a photograph of the work.
- 2. Critical Thinking. Write a 5-7 paragraph paper that analyzes the form and function of any of the works of art used as an example in Part I (the list and images will be posted on blackboard.) Describe the work of art in terms of color, line, shape, & etc. In your opinion, what purpose does the art serve? Who created it and why? How is it interpreted by critics and scholars? What is your reaction to it and why? Use proper citations for your research.
- 3. Film Analysis Essay. Using any perspective, write an critical essay about any film. 5-7 paragraphs.

- 4. Communication Project. Create any work of visual art that you wish using any visual medium. It may be a drawing, painting, sculpture, photo essay (10 photos with text), computer graphic, or short video (2-4 min max). The work must be a personal commentary (of yours) on one of the major issues facing your community (crime, immigration, economics, infrastructure, ideological conflicts, & etc.) The work should reflect the fundamentals of art and design as we have discussed them so far in class. The work should take you 3-5 hours to produce.
- 5. Analyzing Historical Art. Write a 5-7 paragraph paper (11 pt. font, double spaced) that analyzes a work of historical art from Part III. Describe the work of art in terms of color, line, shape, & etc. What culture created the art and why? Under what conditions was the art created? What purpose has it served over the years? How is it viewed and understood today? What is your reaction to it and why? Use proper citations for your research.
- 6. Teamwork Projects 1 & 2. Working in a group, create a visual presentation that discusses a major piece of Dallas public art or architecture. Using at least 10 slides, explain the history, form, and function of the piece. What does it look like? Why? Where is it? Why is it there? Who made it? Why? You must all visit the site as a group, take pictures and notes, and work on the project as a team. Each team member will participate in the presentation and submit a 3-5 paragraph paper (same format as the others) that explains your role in the group and how your opinion about the piece in question.
- 7. Reflective Essays I-IV: After completing a section of the textbook, write a reflective essay explaining what you learned and how it relates to the art you engage with in your life. 3-4 paragraphs.

Attendance is mandatory. **-1 point** will be deducted from your final grade for each unexcused absence. If you are going to be absent, you must notify your professor prior to missing class. Absences will be excused for illness and family emergencies only.
