Course Goals	Spanish 1010 is an elementary Spanish course designed to develop active listening		
	reading, writing and speaking skills. This course requires creative oral		
	participation of students to promote authentic communication. Grammar structures		
	will be taught with the purpose of improving comprehension and development of		
	more advanced language skills.		

Learning Objectives/Outcomes:

- **1.** Chapter 1 Hola, ¿Qué tal? : Students will be able to meet and greet others, describe themselves and others, count to 30, talk about likes and dislikes, tell time, get information by asking questions, know "ser, gustar, and hay" and some interrogative words.
- **2. Chapter 2 En la universidad:** Students will be able to talk about the university, discuss courses and professors, talk about activities done on campus. Students will be familiar with articles, -ar verbs, "estar", negation, interrogative words.
- **3. Chapter 3 La familia:** Students will be able to describe friends and family, tell age, identify a person's nationality, discuss professions and occupations, tell what belongs to themselves and others. Students will be familiar with the verb "ser", descriptive possessive adjectives, -er and -ir verbs, placement of adjectives, verbs "tener" and "venir."
- **4. Chapter 4 Los pasatimepos:** Students will be able to talk about their pastimes, sports ad places in the city, discuss preferences, talk about the future. Students will be familiar with stem-changing verbs, "tener" idioms, "ir + a + infinitive", verbs with irregular "yo" forms.
- **5. Chapter 5 Las vacaciones:** Students will be able to talk about travel and vacation, seasons and weather, months of the year and ordinal numbers. Students will be familiar with estar with conditions and emotions, preset progressive form, difference on the use of ser and estar, direct object nouns and pronouns.

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Exams: written and oral tests designed to measure knowledge of presented course material

Quizzes and Activities: - written and oral assignments designed to supplement and reinforce course material

Oral Presentations: - oral presentations are designed to measure ability to apply presented course material on the research topic assigned in the class.
