COURSE EVALUATION METHODS

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

- 1. Spanish work-sheets (online): Students will have 10 worksheets to complete in Spanish specially focused on simple classroom interactions e.g., teacher-student interaction; teacher-parent interactions; taking attendance; explaining grammar to students, explaining art projects, responding to questions in the classroom (20%)
- 2. Journaling (online): Every week you will be asked to work on a journal thread. The teacher will sometimes post concrete questions. The questions will be posted online.(20%)
- 3. Planning your class: Every classroom period you will present a lesson plan on how you are going to proceed in the class (30%)
- 4. Final paper: you will write an auto-ethnography which reflects on moments in the classroom in which you realized that some method of language teaching was not working and how you changed it so that it would work. You can also reflect on some problems that you had with specific students and how you solved them or how the experience of teaching has changed who you are. (30%)
