IMPORTANT NOTE

In this class I am going to apply the flip-the-course method. Before every class period I will assign the materials (many times lectures about grammar) and homework online exercises you have to complete for the next-class period. During the next class period I will resolve doubts and we will focus on more interactive exercises i.e., we will be speaking more in Spanish. This implies more accountability on the side of the student to come prepared to active learning exercises.

COURSE EVALUATION METHODS

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

- 1. **Class participation:** Participation in class discussions will be graded every week (starting week 2). Arriving late to class late will result in a lower grade. **Absolutely no** electronic devises are permitted during class meetings. See rubric below for participation. (10%)
- 2. **Homework (www.vhlcentral.com):** The exercises are going to be on schedule on Blackboad, but students need to access www.vhlcentral.com. (10%)
- **3. Quizzes (4):** There are 4 quizzes that will be announced during class time for next class meeting. Quizzes can be either about vocabulary and/or grammatical structures we have learnt in class. (20%)
- **4. Compositions (2):** There will be 2 assigned compositions during the semester: 1 will be an in-class composition, 1 will be assigned to do at home. (10%)

Every composition outside of class must be:

- **5. Chapter exams (3):** After every chapter is covered, students will be tested about the material covered in class. (25%)
- **6. Oral Exam (2):** During the semester students will have to prepare for 2 oral exams based on interviews, roleplays and/or presentations. (15%)

7. Final exam (1): The final exam for this class will be comprehensive and will be designed to evaluate the overall understanding and knowledge of grammar, vocabulary and their capacity to write short compositions with accuracy in the language. (10%)
