Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Laboratory (100 points) – You will perform experiments designed to give you hands-on real-world applications of the lecture material. In some cases, you will watch documentaries to complement the experiments. After each laboratory exercise, you will have an assignment worth 10 - 20 points, for a total of 100 points. **Each assignment is due at the beginning of the next lab session.** You do not receive a separate grade for lab, so the points received for the laboratory (out of 100) will be added into the lecture grade calculation.

Note: The lab is worth 25% of your final overall grade for the course. However, you must receive a passing grade (60% or higher) in the laboratory to receive a passing grade in the class. Students must pass both the lecture and the lab independently to pass the course (i.e. if you fail the lab, you automatically fail the entire course and if you fail the lecture, you automatically fail the course).

Grade Determination:

Separate letter grades will not be assigned for the lab. As mentioned in the syllabus for BIOL1132D_095, the lab is worth one-fourth of the total course grade (25%). This is a large component of your course grade and should be an opportunity to improve your grade, rather than harm it. You must receive a passing grade (60% or higher) in the laboratory to receive a passing grade in the class.
