Course Goals or Overview:					

The goal of this course is to give students a strong understanding of the legal doctrines encompassing intellectual property law, as well as its applicability to "real-life" business operations. The course will provide a comprehensive guide to each field within the umbrella of intellectual property, namely, trademarks, copyrights, patents, trade secrets and unfair competition. The methods by which each is created, procedures to register or protect each, duration of rights, protection from infringement, and new and international developments will be addressed for each of these fields of intellectual property. Students will be able to spot legal and ethical issues of case studies, then articulate the connections and tensions among these issues.

	United States and procedures through cooperative treaties in foreign jurisdictions.

	protection and those applied to cutting-edge issues such as technological innovations, digital creative				
	works, the role of the Internet, and principles of trade secret misappropriation.				
3	Be able to explain effectively to legal professionals what intellectual property rights they're seeking to				
	develop and protect in their businesses, using this professional advice to engage in a risk-benefit analysis,				
	and make decisions supported by good-faith business judgments.
