Adjustment of Exam scores *may* be made immediately after the exam (not at the end of the course) after analysis of the frequency of questions missed.

<u>Attendance</u>: Attendance is expected and will be recorded at the beginning and end of each class. Attendance in this class is defined as a student present for the entire duration of the class. Late arrival to class will count as an absence. Late arrival is defined as a student not being present when his or her name is called.
