7	Measure and explain variation from budgeted costs and revenues. Evaluated by examination and presentation of homework solutions.
8	Work in a team environment to achieve specified results. Evaluated by examination and presentation of research and homework solutions.
9	Identify and use relevant information in common business decisions. Evaluated by examination and presentation of homework solutions.

Team Project:

This project will consist of 2 parts, a Professional Research/IFRS Problem, and a team presentation to report to the class the results of the research. This project will be performed in teams of 3-5, to be assigned by the instructor. The research paper must be submitted electronically using Turnitin (on Blackboard). The research paper will be in APA format, and a maximum 10 pages double-spaced (not including cover and reference pages). At least three (3) academic references (from professional publications, or otherwise peer reviewed), properly cited within the body of the paper are required. Both the research paper and the presentation of results will be accomplished as a team effort; all team members will receive the same grade, so long as all team members contribute to the paper and the presentation. The due date for the report is indicated on the attached class schedule.

Exam Policy:

Exams should be taken as scheduled. No makeup examinations will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook).
