## Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

### Case Studies/Discussion Questions

The professor will select 4 case studies/sets of Discussion Questions for the students to review this semester. Case studies/Discussion Questions will correlate with the current topics in tourism industry and management. Each student will be required to answer the questions following the case study or discussion questions. Proper grammar is expected.

### Project/Presentation

Students will be asked to complete a project this semester and present their findings. The project will require the student to select an organization or city, identify a potential tourist group, develop a plan to market to the new tourists, and strategically implement an action plan for the organization or city to handle the new demand of tourism.

### Midterm/Final

There will be two tests given this semester, a midterm and a final. The tests will cover both material from the assigned book readings as well as the lectures discussed in class. Tests will consist of multiple choice, true/false, short answer, and essay questions.

### Quizzes

There will be a total of 20 quizzes given throughout the semester. Each student is responsible for reading the chapter and then taking the quiz before the due date. Quizzes will be administered on the course tool Black Board. Questions will be multiple choice and true/false.

### Guest Speaker Reflection Paper

There will be one guest speaker this semester. It is mandatory that you attend this class. After the speaker is done, students will be required to write a reflection paper on what they learned from the guest speaker. The paper

should be 1 to 3 pages long. There should be a summary of the speaker's talking points, what the students learned, and anything they might have disagreed with.
