Discussion Board Posts:

Discussion Boards are the way we will share ideas, concepts, and experiences in this class. It is true that this cannot replace face to face conversation. Quizzes

In this class quizzes will be based on the textbook and weekly reading materials. These are designed to determine if you have read the material and are able to show that you have understood the concepts considered.

Short answer, multiple guess, T/F format will be used to review your readings.

Exams

Mid-term and Final exams will help you understand the how well you can bring the concepts together to address current 'real world' issues of the Hospitality Industry. **Essays** are the preferred format for this type of review.

Case Studies

We will step into real world scenarios and **analyze** what, why, when where, and who of selected companies. Small groups will work together to make recommendations on how the company should proceed with the marketing and sales opportunities before them.
