Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Case Studies

The professor will select 3 case studies for the students to review this semester. Case studies will correlate with the current topics in restaurant management. Each student will be required to answer the questions following the case study. Proper grammar is expected.

Project/Presentation

Students will be asked to design a restaurant and menu for their project. Any type of restaurant is acceptable. Requirements of the project will include a printed menu, food cost and sales sheet, training guide, and description of restaurant design. Students will also need to present their restaurant concept to the class in a 15 minute presentation with visual aids.

Midterm/Final-NA

There will be two tests given this semester, a midterm and a final. The tests will cover both material from the assigned book readings as well as the lectures discussed in class. Tests will consist of multiple choice, true/false, short answer, and essay questions.

Attendance/Participation

Attendance and participation is expected and required throughout the semester. If the student is not present in class then they will miss valuable information about restaurant management. It is impossible to participate in class if you are not present as well. Participation will be tracked through attendance and in class activities.
