Note: This software is **required** to complete the assignments that comprise a substantial part of your grade. An individual copy **must be purchased** to obtain the certificate that allows logging into this software whether running it at home or in our lab.

GOALS: At the end of the course, you should

- 1. attain an increased understanding of the use of statistics in business decision making,
- 2. be better able to select the appropriate statistical tool/methodology to aid in business decision making,
- 3. be able to use Excel to describe and analyze numerical data,
- 4. be better able to communicate in the language of applied business statistics,
- 5. be able to manipulate simple statistical formulae to solve problems.

EVALUATION

To demonstrate your ability to use quantitative techniques in business, you will answer exam questions based on short cases. Rather than being purely numerical, problems will be presented in written language. In addition, you will work on Excel case studies that require you to use an Excel spreadsheet program to analyze and describe real-world business data. By simulating real business problems and requiring you to communicate in writing through the language of statistics, these evaluation instruments will reinforce the course objectives.

GENERAL COMMENTS:

- 1. Most students find that this class requires large amounts of resources to achieve success.
 - a. One of the demanding aspects of this course is the large number of new topics, coupled with the multiple ways of presenting them. There are two primary learning sources (textbook and Hawkes); however, use of additional sources—e.g. tutors, Khan videos, other textbooks, etc.—could possibly add to the level of complexity (due to alternative ways of explanation and notation) while at the same time improving understanding. Finding the optimal mix is a challenge.

- b.The most important resource is *time*, along with the willingness to use it for this class. How much time are we talking about here? The old rule-of-thumb was 2-3 hours outside of class for every hour inside of class. If you use the 2 hour figure, you will need 6 hours per week outside of class to invest in this class for a moderate outcome (say "C" or "B" level of work). What do you do with your time? Read (text, Powerpoints, practice tests), practice your skills by working problems, work in the Hawkes tutorial program. Doing the assignments is essential to succeeding in this course. For optimal results, you should read every textbook problem. You should work as many of the textbook problems as possible. In addition to the problems in the textbook, the Adventures in Statistics modules (Hawkes) are intended to assist you in better structuring the learning time you spend on practice problems. Many of the textbook practice problems have answers in the back of the textbook. Keep up with the assignments!!
- c.You will be able to modify the resource requirements by *your* amount of facility in mathematics and Excel that you bring to class. If you are lacking in these skills, you will need to allocate more time, and vice-versa.
- 2. Absences and tardiness are likely to cause you to miss significant materials; this generally results in a lower grade.
- 3. You are expected to read and understand the relevant sections of the textbook. All reading material is testable, even if it is not emphasized in the lecture.
- 4. Practice problems are discussed in class. They come from the end-of-chapter / end-of-section problems. Understanding these problems is critical to learning the material well enough to complete exams within allotted time.
- 5. You should not hesitate to ask questions in class. Usually someone else has the same question, so, by asking in class, everyone can benefit from your question.
- 6. If you drop the course, you are responsible for seeing that you are properly withdrawn or dropped before the scheduled last drop day. Anyone who stops attending class should execute the drop procedure since failure to do so may result in a grade of "F" which cannot be changed.
- 7. Course grades are available electronically in the week following final-exam week.
- 8. Hawkes Tutorial Exercises: Ten tutorial exercises using the Hawkes Learning modules are assigned. These are an important part of the course grade. You will *not* submit anything here since the modules must be certified *online*. Detailed information on certifying Hawkes modules is presented at the end of this syllabus and in the course web site. If you encounter difficulty with Hawkes assignments, print (or send) some screen shots for us to examine in class.

- 9. Excel Assignments: Four computer exercises using Excel are assigned. Output from these assignments will be used to complete on-line quizzes via Hawkes Learning System and, as such, are an important part of the course grade.
- 10. Exams: There will be three in-class exams. For each exam, you will be allowed to use a calculator and a formula sheet. All exams are open book but **NOT** open notes.

Notes on Excel Assignments:

Excel Assignments are assessed using the Web Quiz feature of the Hawkes Learning System. You will need your excel assignment outputs, your text, and your calculator to successfully take the assessment quiz for each assignment.

Taking Online Excel Quizzes

Get into the Hawkes software as usual (as though you were going to complete one of the 10 modules). At the bottom of the page, select **Web Test.** This will open the Web Test area. Select **Take Test** on the left side of the page. When a new window opens, select **Assigned Test** and **OK.** From the **Select a Test** menu, you can select the appropriate quiz.

- (1) These quizzes will not open until the scheduled time announced in class. Once you select the Begin Test button, the clock is running for the assigned time allotted for the quiz. If you log off before completing the quiz, you will receive either a -0- or partial credit for the portion you did complete. Therefore, get everything you need (e.g., hard copy of the Excel spreadsheets, calculator, textbook) BEFORE opening the quiz.
- (2) Be sure to turn off your firewall (if you have one) before starting an Excel quiz.
