#### **Course Evaluation Methods**

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

# Assignments (30%)

There are 4 assignments. Students are expected to write a literature review (40pts), collect fieldnotes (30pts), conduct and write-up an interview (40pts), and conduct and write-up a content analysis exercise (40pts)

#### Exams (30%)

There are 3 exams. Each exam is worth 50points. Exams are multiple choice tests based on class lectures and readings.

#### Research Proposal (40%)

Students are expected to turn in a research proposal paper worth 200 points. This paper requires that students design a qualitative research project (of their choosing) A detailed paper guide will be distributed in class. Paper should be typed, double-spaced, using 12pt font. Length should be no less than 10 pages.
