### **Course Evaluation Methods**

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

**Exams** – written tests designed to measure knowledge of presented course material. There are three exams that will be based on class lectures and any additional readings/information assigned in class. Exams will be a combination of multiple choice and short answer questions. Each exam is worth 50 points. The total for all three exams is 150 points.

**Assignments** – written assignments designed to supplement and reinforce course material. There is one <u>required</u> writing assignment in this course. Students are expected to turn in a 5-7 page paper. The paper is worth a total of 50 points. The instructor will give directions for the paper during the first couple weeks of class.
