# **Course Evaluation Methods**

## Assignments (50%)

There are 4 assignments. Students are expected to write a literature review (20pts), collect and write-up field notes (20pts), conduct and write-up an interview (20pts), and conduct and write-up a group content analysis exercise (40pts), online assignments each worth 8.3 points. There is no face-to-face class on an only hybrid day. Students are expected to complete the posted Blackboard assignment on the posted deadline given on Blackboard.

## Exams (50%)

There are 3 exams. Each exam is worth 50points. Exams are multiple choice tests based on class lectures and readings.
