The course content covers sentence formation, emphasizes audience, purpose and occasion, and focuses on skills needed for argumentation and exposition. Students must complete the requirements of the course with a grade of C or better in order to meet the prerequisite for ENGL 1310 of ENGL 1313. UGRW 1200 does not apply to degree. (Pass/Fail)

- Write an essay with a three-part structure (introduction/body/conclusion) that makes a point;
- Support general statements with specific details and examples;
- recognize the difference between writing for an audience and writing for self;
- employ a strong writer's voice and revise and edit writing for standard written English;
- X identify the parts of speech; and
- Advelop proofreading strategies to be able to edit writing for the following errors: apostrophes in contractions, possessives, and misused apostrophes; articles and prepositions; awkward wording; capitalization; commas with items in a series, coordinating conjunctions, introductory clauses, phrases, and transitional devices, and unnecessary commas; ten commonly confused words a/an/and; are/our; it's/its; knew/know/new/no; than/then; their/there/they're; to/too/two; were/we're/where; whose/who's; your/you're parallelism; omitted words and letters; pronoun case, agreement, and reference; quotation marks; run-ons and sentence fragments; subject-verb agreement; verb tense consistency; and document design.
