Description: Historical evolution of Mexican-American culture, social structure,

family patterns and community organizations, and their effects on education, economic and religious institutions. Lectures will focus on political, economic, and societal forces contributing to Mexican-

American history and culture.

Requirements: Students will be graded for this course based on the following:

<u>Exams:</u> There will be a mid-term and final exam both of which are essay based. The possible exam questions will be given via a Review Sheet in advance and discussed in class. Material for tests may be drawn from the text, as well as the instructor's lecture.

<u>Scholarly Review:</u> Student reviews should focus on book's central thesis and major themes. These should be 2 to 3 pages double-spaced in length. Books will also be discussed in class. Students are provided with an example review for format reference. (see attached)

Attendance and Participation: Readings will be discussed in class. There will be a class discussion period on most class days. Every student is expected to participate. There will also be several videos in class that will also require discussion participation.
