Course Evaluation Methods

Research Case – You will be given an accounting case and will complete accounting research related to that topic. Your grade will be based on clear and concise written communication as well as correct research answers.

Homework – You will use Connect Accounting to complete and submit your homework problems. No other submission method will be accepted. The due dates and times are included in the assignments. Late work will not be accepted. You may work and rework the Homework assignments as many times as you want within the time window. All of your grades will be reported to me, and I will record the best grade for each assignment.
